INDIANAPOLIS TEAM LOSES CLAIM

National Commission Decides That New York Does Not Have to Pay for Kauff

CINCINNATI, O., April 15.—The claim of the Indianapolis American Association baseball club to \$10,000 for the services of player Benny Kauff was denied and the case dismissed by the national baseball commission here today.

The Indianapolis club claimed to have entered into an agreement with the New York Nationals on August 28, 1914, for the sale of Kauff to New York. The agreement, however, stated:

"Within contract is signed with the understanding that the Indianapolis Athletic Association shall have a legal contract with said Benny Kauff."

The Indianapolis club admitted it did not have a contract with the player, it claim to his services being through draft and reservation.
