

WALKER GUILTY

Negro Gets Ninety Days and \$100 Fine for Shipping Whiskey in Lard.

George Walker, negro restaurant keeper of this city, was convicted Saturday in United States district court at Philippi of a charge of violating the federal pure food and drugs act by shipping whiskey imbedded in two cans of lard into the state, the offense having taken place in this city some time ago. Judge Dayton fined him \$100 and costs and sentenced him to serve ninety days in the Harrison county jail.

Walker was brought back to the county jail Saturday night by Deputy Sheriff Laco Wolfe, John Siers, county detective, and J. H. Tenney, deputy state commissioner of prohibition, who were attending federal court at Philippi as witnesses.

AUTOISTS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

Miss Mabel Paugh Sustains Painful Injuries When Car Takes a Plunge.

Miss Mabel Paugh and Miss Daisy Hardman, both school teachers in the city schools, and Ira D. Starkey, an employee of the Clarksburg Tire Company, had a narrow escape from death or serious injury about 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon when the automobile in which they were riding plunged over a thirty-foot precipice near the residence of P. C. Sturm on the Bridgeport road. The machine did not overturn when it landed at the foot of the precipice but instead ran about two hundred yards through a rough field, finally plunging into a fence.

Miss Paugh was the only one of the trio sustaining painful injuries. Her head was badly gashed. She was attended by a physician and is expected to fully recover in a day or two. Miss Hardman and Mr. Starkey escaped with minor bruises and scratches.

The machine was practically demolished as a result of striking the fence.

Mr. Starkey, who was driving the car, was unable to describe the manner in which the accident occurred. He was quoted as saying that the "first thing I knew the machine was flying through space."

All three occupants of the machine declared that the car was running at a slow rate of speed when the accident occurred.

GLASS PLANTS

Close Blast for the Summer but An Early Resumption is Expected.

The season's blast closed at the Peerless, LaFayette, Adamston and Norwood window glass plants here Saturday noon along with all other plants in the United States. The machine plants here will cease operations for the summer about July 1.

The closing of the hand plants here means that 1,000 men retired from that work for the summer. This number, however, is not yet complete as the cutters did not quit work along with the blowers, gatherers and flatteners at noon Saturday. They will quit as soon as they finish their work which will be from Monday to Thursday.

Owing to the lively markets an early resumption of operations at the factories is looked for. It is expected that next year's blast will start the middle of September or the last of that month, instead of in November as has been customary.

A short funeral service will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Neff home and the body will be taken to Weston on the 4:30 o'clock interurban car and taken to the home of Mrs. Neff's sister, Mrs. H. H. Clayton, where funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon and the burial will be in a Weston cemetery.

FEENEY LANDS IN COUNTY JAIL

Under Two Felony Capiases Following Threats to Whip Deputy.

Not long after Dugan Feeney, a young man of the East End, had made promiscuous threats around in that part of the city Saturday night that he could lick Deputy Sheriff Laco Wolfe "in any part of the road" Dugan was a prisoner in the county jail. Deputy Sheriff Wolfe himself took Dugan into custody by virtue of two capiases that had been issued under felony indictments returned against him by the grand jury at the November, 1915, term of the criminal court.

There seems to have been a discrepancy somewhere in the dates regarding the thrashing of the deputy sheriff. It was intended to be done after Mr. Wolfe gets out of office, although the deputy told Dugan he would waive any little technicalities like that in order to accommodate him. Dugan is apparently a stickler for technicalities, as he decided to let the matter go over.

LILLY LOSES

State Supreme Court Denies His Petition for a Writ of Mandamus.

CHARLESTON, May 27.—With Judge Poffenbarger dissenting and Judge William N. Miller not voting, the supreme court of appeals today denied the petition of A. A. Lilly for a writ of mandamus to compel the county court of Cabell county to revise the list of election officers for the coming general primary and make it conform to the list submitted by members of the county executive committee. The court is considering a petition for an appeal and superedeas from the judgment of the circuit court of Mingo county, which awarded a writ of mandamus to compel revision of the registration lists in that county.

The lower court granted the petition for the writ on hearing evidence that dead men, mules and dogs are registered as legal voters.

FAIRMONT WANTS

Annual Encampment of the National Guard of West Virginia Held There.

CHARLESTON, May 27.—Mayor Anthony Bowen, and the chamber of commerce of the city of Fairmont have communicated with the adjutant general's office here asking that the annual encampment of the National Guard of West Virginia be held there. General Bond said today he believed it would be found advisable to hold regimental encampments, the first infantry taking part in one and the second in the other.
