

NIGRO SHOWS WILL ARRIVE IN CITY TODAY

To Exhibit at Norwood Park Here All of the Coming Week.

SALES FROM JUG

Of Liquor across Restaurant Counter Charged and Henry Banks is Jailed.

Henry Banks, colored, is a prisoner in the county jail awaiting a hearing or a trial on a charge of violating the prohibition law as the result of a sudden and unexpected visit of officers at his restaurant on Traders alley at 7:30 o'clock Saturday evening. Banks had been running a restaurant in the old city fire department building on the alley and the officers who took him in tow declare that according to evidence furnished them, he had been selling whiskey across the counter from a big jug on a shelf. The officers, John H. Tenney, deputy state commissioner of prohibition, and Deputy Sheriff Laco Wolfe, seized the suspected jug and found it to contain whiskey. They also took charge of a pint bottle partly filled with whiskey, which they also found upon the shelf.

BAD CHECKS

Are Charged against Stealey Heights Man and He is Jailed.

Accused of issuing two bad checks, D. D. Kelley, a barber residing at Stealey Heights, was arrested Saturday and put in the county jail by Constable C. Q. Stout to await further proceedings. Kelley's arrest was made on two warrants issued by Magistrate Jackson V. Carter on the complaint of Frank Foley, who alleges that Kelley issued one check in favor of the Harrison County Auto and Garage Company on the Union National Bank for \$36 and another of the same kind for \$54, when he had insufficient funds to meet them.

BRIDGE BIDS

Are Opened by County Court but Contracts Are Not Awarded as Yet.

The county court Saturday afternoon before taking a recess until Wednesday morning opened the bids of the Luton Bridge Company, of York, Pa., the Concrete Steel Bridge Company, of the city, the Bridgeport Building and Block Company, of Bridgeport, the Wetzel Engineering Company, of New Martinsville, the Farris Bridge Company, of New York, and M. J. Fahy, of the city, for the erection of new bridges in the county. The court intends to have eight bridges erected this summer as follows: Two across Gnatty creek, and one each across Little Rock Camp, Little Tennille, Limestone, Big Rock Camp and Big Tennille and one near Fonda in Sardis district. One firm's bid was a little over \$10,000 for all eight bridges.

CAR STRIKES WAGON

And Demolishes It, but Youthful Driver Luckily Escapes with Only Slight Bruises.

A one-horse wagon driven by Linwood Young, age 10, son of Laco L. Young, of Center Branch, was struck by a Broad Oaks trolley car at the crossing of the Buckhannon pike about 8 o'clock Saturday evening. The wagon was demolished but the youth luckily escaped with only slight bruises.

The car was derailed and traffic on the New Fair Grounds division was tied up for the remainder of the night.

The wagon was loaded with feed, all of which was destroyed. The horse ran away with what remained of the wagon but was later captured.

CHARTER

Is Issued to New Huntington Concern by the State.

CHARLESTON, July 1.—Solof Brothers, of Huntington, were issued a certificate of incorporation by the secretary of state today. The authorized capital is \$100,000 and the incorporators are A. Solof, B. Solof, G. A. Kooz, M. A. Simms and H. M. Blaisdell, all of Huntington, Charleston and Montgomery. The concern will operate a chain of 11 stores.

LUNACY COMPLAINT.

Clyde Yeager made complaint Saturday afternoon against his step-mother, Rebecca J. Yeager, wife of Levi Yeager, of near Brown, charging her with being a lunatic. She is 50 years old. The county lunacy commission has set no date yet for her hearing as she has not been taken into custody.

SOLDIERS DELAY TRAINS.

Movement of troop trains over the Baltimore and Ohio railroad system delayed fast passenger trains No. 12 and No. 55 Saturday evening. Both of the trains arrived at 7:20 o'clock. No. 12 is due at the local station at 5:40 o'clock, and No. 55 at 6:08 o'clock.

INHERITANCE TAXES

Collected during the Year in This State Amount to Nearly \$157,000.

CHARLESTON, July 1.—The amount of inheritance taxes collected during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1916, by the state tax commissioner, was almost \$157,000. Of this amount \$6,500 was received yesterday from the estate of the late W. H. McCoy, of Sistersville, Tyler county. The new year's business was started with a check for over \$7,000 from the estate of the late Henry Schmulbach, of Wheeling. Of the amount collected during the year \$40,000 was received from non-residents on the transfer of stock in West Virginia corporations. Forfeitures collected during the year amounted to \$22,000, the smallest amount in any year during the last six years.

PHILLIPS RESIGNS.

Robert B. Phillips, genial agent of the New York Life Insurance Company, has resigned after being with the company here and in Florida the last two years. It has not been announced in what business he will engage.

TO PROTECT CANAL.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Secretary Baker today asked Congress for \$4,616,397 for Panama canal protection, of which \$3,828,000 would be for land defense armaments and ammunition and \$26,000 for building roads in the canal zone. He asked \$60,000 for searchlights.

YEAR'S ROAD WORK FACES LLOYD DUFF

Sentences Are Imposed but He is Granted Time in Which to Take Appeals.

Two sentences of six months each in jail and on the roads were given Lloyd Duff Saturday afternoon in the criminal court by Judge James W. Robinson. In addition the judgment of the court was that he pay a fine of \$100 and costs in one case and a fine of \$500 and costs in another. Also the court's judgment includes a stipulation that he shall give bond of \$1,000 not to sell liquor for two years.

Duff had been convicted at the term of carrying liquor into the state improperly labeled and for this he drew six months and a fine of \$100. He had also been convicted of having liquor for the purpose of selling it and for this he drew six months and a fine of \$500. The latter case was based on his arrest near Bristol a few weeks ago with a wagon load, or 995 pints, in his possession and on the way home with it. The bond not to sell for two years was required in this case.

Suspension orders were entered until September 26, to give Duff an opportunity to appeal the case to the circuit court. He gave bond of \$1,000 in the first case and \$1,500 in the second.

The court before adjourning to September 26 looked after several other matters. Pearl Buccafurri gave bond of \$1,000 with Larry Cann surety. Clayton Pigott renewed his parole bond of \$200.
