## CONGRESSMAN MOSS IS TAKEN BY DEATH

### Parkersburg Jurist and Legislator Succumbs to Illness in Atlantic City.

Congressman Hunter H. Moss, of Parkersburg, brother of Mrs. Charles B. Alexander, of this city, died at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon in Atlantic City after an illness of three or four months duration. His body will be taken to Parkersburg and the funeral will take place at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon at his late home there.

Hunter Holmes Moss was born at Parkersburg May 26, 1874, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hunter Holmes Moss. He was graduated from the public schools in his native city and then in order to procure a business education he spent a year and a half as a clerk in the First National Bank at Parkersburg and afterward went to West Virginia University at Morgantown, where he took a special academic course, and then the law course in that institution, obtaining the degree of bachelor of law. After his graduation he returned to Parkersburg and entered into the practice of law.

Prosecuting Attorney. Mr. Moss was nominated by the

Republicans of his county and elected prosecuting attorney at the age of 26. Next he was nominated by the Republicans for judge of the Fourth judicial circuit of West Virginia and was elected by a large majority. He served on the bench eight years with distinction and before the expiration of his term was nominated by the same party as a candidate for the Sixty-sixth Congress. Notwithstanding John M. Hamilton, his Democratic opponent, had been elected two years prior to that time by a majority of more than 2,000 votes, Judge Moss was elected by a majority of 1,099 votes.

In 1902, Mr. Moss married Miss Anna Ambler, of Parkersburg, to which union three children were born. Mrs. Moss and the children survive him. His father, who was a prominent banker of Parkersburg, died two years ago. His mother survives. The only other surviving member of the immediate family is Mrs. Charles B. Alexander.

While Congressman Moss had always been a Republican and in fact made Republican speeches on the hustings before he was of age, he was always progressive in his ideas and tendencies and so he received the full endorsement of the Progressive party in the election of 1912. As a member of Congress, he served on prominent committees and faithfully represented his constituents with em-

## DOLLAR A VOTE

### Is the Present Plan of the "Progressive" Prohibitionists in the Campaign.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 15.—Confident they will outrank the Socialists in November and become the third political party of the country, representatives of "progressive" elements in the prohibition organization who arrived in St. Paul today, for next week's national convention, announced their plans for a \$1,000,000 campaign which they expect will net their ticket 1,000,000 votes.

Dr. Raleigh Colvig, of New York, president of the intercollegiate association and one of the leaders in the "progressive" element, said the coming campaign would mark an epoch in the history of the Prohibition movement in America establishing the party as a menace to the permanency of both the Republican and Democratic organizations.

Dr. Colvig said "the principal factors in increasing the vote would be the support of the women in the states where they have the ballot and the new strength the party will receive by accessions from the broken ranks of the Progressive party."

"The difference between a campaign fund of \$50,000 and one of \$1,000,000, will be reflected in the Prohibition party vote."
