Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, honorary president of the National American Suffrage Association, is the foremost suffragist among suffragists today. Preacher, doctor, writer and orator, Dr. Shaw has given her multifield services to the cause of women ever since she discovered as a girl that women were an unprivileged and handicapped class.

Dr. Shaw was born in Tyne, England, in 1847. When she was four years old her family came to Massachusetts, and subsequently moved to Big Rapids, Mich., where she received a common school education. At the age of fifteen Miss Shaw began teaching school and taught five years.




