FINANCIAL.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Enormous trading in United States Steel was again the foremost feature of the week end session, that stock on its further advance of a point to 120 1/2, coming with one-fourth of a point of its record achieved the latter part of September. Dealings in steel amounted to about 250,000 shares out of a total of 775,000 shares.

Other striking features were the new record made by general motors, which rose thirty-six points to \$25, and the new maximums scored by sugar shares Cuba cane rising a fraction to 69 1/2; American beet 1 1/2 to 10 1/2, and Cuba-American 8 1/2 to 22 1/2, with a twelve point advance for South Porto Rico to 220, that quotation being far below its high level.

Central leather also broke in the ground, advancing seven points to eighty-nine, and Utah Copper, on its gain of 3 1/2, duplicated its record with substantial improvement in other metals.

Maintenance of consumptive demands in unparalleled volume with costs rising rapidly continue one of the most remarkable features of the times. Each week prices already at an extreme position, go still higher and the advances embrace a wide range of commodities; yet current and forward purchasing is unabated and competitive bidding again accentuates the strength of many markets.

It remains the exception where the seller seeks the buyer, and some manufacturers have withdrawn quotations entirely as a means of checking the influx of orders which cannot be filled for months to come, or which they are not inclined to accept lest the prices change to their advantage.
