

THE MARKET. Silver stronger. Wheat steady. Barley weaker. Oats, Corn and Rye still quiet. Feedstuffs unchanged. Hay in larger receipt. Potatoes somewhat higher. Onions unchanged. Butter arrives heavily. Eggs continue to improve. Poultry nominal. Game quiet. Oranges and Limes lower. Lemons unchanged. Dried Fruits dull. Asparagus, Rhubarb and Green Peas declined. Heavy receipts of Rice. Advance in house coats. Decrease in imports. Provisions tending upward.

WEATHER BUREAU REPORT.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE. WEATHER BUREAU, SAN FRANCISCO, MARCH 25, 5 P. M.—The pressure is highest to-night in Wyoming and lowest along the Pacific coast. The wind is from the north and is shifting to the eastward but is still light. The weather is partly cloudy throughout. Northern California and Southern Oregon, and also along Puget Sound, there are some indications that a storm is approaching from the north. California or Southern Oregon coast, but it is still as considerable a distance as to be expected within the next twenty-four hours. Unfortunately the reports from Eureka are missing on account of the storm. Unusually high temperatures prevail to-night throughout California and Arizona, the highest being at Yuma, 75.0; Phoenix, 74.0; Los Angeles, 73.0; San Luis Obispo, 72.0; Fresno, 71.0; Red Bluff, 70.0; Independence, 69.0; Sacramento, 68.0; San Francisco, 67.0. It is probable that the temperature will be slightly cooler along the California coast to-morrow.

Following are seasonal rainfalls as compared with those of last season on same date: Eureka 36.34, 48.25; Red Bluff 45.85, 45.85; San Francisco 18.87, 22.00; Sacramento 22.22, last season 18.85; San Francisco 23.00, last season 16.70; Fresno 11.75, last season 8.12; Independence 12.00, last season 6.40; San Diego 10.75, last season 3.98; Yuma 2.97, last season 2.16. A forecast data: Maximum temperature 70 deg.; minimum 52 deg.; mean 61 deg. Clouds 40 per cent. Wind from the north, with gusts during the night, March 26, 1895.
