When, however, heavy frosts were predicted for South Dakota, Texas, Kansas and Missouri, threatening the destruction of corn, which is now promising, the price of corn began to shoot skyward, which could not longer be controlled, and jumped for about half an hour like a pea on a hot stove. It rose to 72½c, dropped in about fifteen minutes to 70¾c, rose again to 72¼c, and closed with buyers at 71¾c. The ordinary market news was not much heeded apart from what referred to the reported damage to the growing crop.

Corn started weak, but it did not stay in that condition very long. July opened at 51¾c and sold from that down to 51½c near the beginning of the session, and for a time floundered in a lazy way at around 51¼c. Soon that was changed entirely and it went shooting about like the shuttle of a sewing-machine. With a bound it went to 55¾c and sold in about ten minutes. The latest trading was at 53½c.
