SAN JOSE, CAL., Dec. 31.—Articles incorporating the Napa College and the University of the Pacific, near this city, under the name of the University of the Pacific, were filed in the Clerk's office to-day. The headquarters of the incorporation are in San Francisco.

The colleges are under the direction of the Methodist Episcopal church and are to be governed by a board of thirty-six trustees, twelve of whom are to be elected each year. WANTED FOR FORGERY.

Bogus Check Cashed by a Firm on the Alameda.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Dec. 31.—A warrant has been issued for A. Miller on a charge of passing a forged check for \$900 on Kane Bros., who conduct a grocery store on the Alameda.

Thursday afternoon Miller called at Kane Bros.' store and presented a check purported to have been signed by Raley & Co., the fruit men, for \$900 in payment. Miller claimed to be an occasional customer of the store and said that the check had been given him in payment for fruit which he had brought from his ranch near Santa Clara. Kane, though the man's face was familiar to him and cashed the check. He subsequently deposited the paper to his credit in the Commercial Savings Bank. A couple of days later the check was returned by the bank, it having been pronounced a forgery.

EXEMPT FIREMEN ORGANIZE.

Members of the Volunteer Fire Department Banded Together.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Dec. 31.—The exempt firemen, at a meeting last night, adopted a constitution and by-laws. Dues were placed at \$1 per year. It was decided that all who had served five years in the Volunteer Fire Department of the city of San Jose, or were in the service in October, 1876, the time when the paid fire department was inaugurated, were eligible to membership.

MRS. DE POISTER DIVORCED.

Custody of Her Children Granted With the Decree of Separation.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Dec. 31.—Catherine de Poister was granted a divorce from A. C. de Poister this morning for alleged cruelty. De Poister, who has been in jail for several months in lieu of a \$2000 bond to keep the peace, appeared in court and said he had decided not to contest the suit.

LOOKED BY BURGLARS.

A Small Sum Taken From the Santa Clara Postoffice.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Dec. 31.—The Santa Clara Postoffice was entered by burglars early yesterday morning. The thieves secured \$16 10 in cash that had been left in the office, but overlooked \$3 in greenbacks in an adjoining drawer. Entrance was effected by cutting through the glass in the front door and reaching through and unlocking the door.

Vagaries of an Insane Man.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Dec. 31.—Thomas Hennessy, who has been stopping at the Sanitarium for some time, was to-day committed to the Agnew Asylum. Hennessy is 69 years of age and unmarried. At night he imagines the building is about to fall, and it is almost impossible to keep him in the house.

In fact, the consensus of opinion among the local congregation is that if the Bishop's statement in the article printed in THE CALL relative to the occurrence in the Masonic Temple stands as his version of the proceedings in the church last Sunday, there can be little doubt as to the superiority of Mr. Pierce's veracity. That is the sentiment of Placerville, and Placerville, orthodox or infidel, is defending a Christian old man who has won the love of capitalist and horny-handed miner by a life filled with philanthropic acts.

WEDDED AT SANTA ROSA.

Marriage of Dr. A. Pierce Preston and Miss Gertrude Rue Solemnized.

A Pretty Ceremony in a Floral Bower, Followed by a Reception to Friends.

SANTA ROSA, CAL., Dec. 31.—Dr. A. Pierce Preston and Miss Gertrude A. Rue were married to-night at 8 o'clock in the First Presbyterian Church on Humboldt and Johnson streets. The church was decorated with a profusion of flowers, evergreens, ribbons and tulle draperies. Rare tropical plants, in pots, were placed here and there with striking effect.

At 8 o'clock the bridal couple entered the main auditorium of the church, from a rear apartment, while the "Lohengrin" wedding march was played. Two little girls, as ribbon bearers, led the way. The bride, on the arm of her brother, E. D. Rue of San Francisco, came last. She was dressed in white, trimmed with orange-flower ornaments. The couple stood under a magnificent floral bower, while the marriage service was performed by Rev. William Martin, pastor of the church. The bride was given away by her brother.

The Misses Dorothy Kinsel, Edith Oleson and Lida Preston were the bridesmaids, Mrs. F. N. Mundy, A. L. Tibbetts and Emilie F. Halstead were the groomsmen. Immediately after the ceremony the reception was held by Dr. and Mrs. Preston at the residence of the bride's brother-in-law, C. A. Wright. It lasted from 9 until 11 o'clock. Dr. and Mrs. Preston stood in a bay-window recess while receiving. A wedding supper was served later.

NEVADA'S GOLD OUTPUT.

Precious Metal Valued at About \$4,000,000 Mined During the Past Year.

Development of Rich Placers Means Prosperity for the Future.

CARSON, NEV., Dec. 31.—An estimate gathered from the Wells, Fargo & Co. agencies and the mint receipts show that Nevada's output of precious metals for the year will aggregate about \$4,000,000 in value, which is \$500,000 larger than the output of 1894. Much of the output of Nevada's gold mines is not recorded in this State, but goes to the Selby Smelting Works, and some is taken over the mountains by wagon transportation and does not go through the express office. The United States mint at this city has always been in bad odor with depositors, as they claimed they did not get the returns called for by their assays, and for this reason a great deal of the gold output is sent to San Francisco and sold by the mint. It cannot be compiled for public information. The mint investigations tend to show that depositors have been systematically robbed and the mining men are watching the result of the investigation with great interest.

BELIEVES PIERCE INSANE.

Bishop Wingfield Again Denounces the Pastor's Affidavit.

BENICIA, CAL., Dec. 31.—Bishop Wingfield's answer to the published statements from Placerville concerning his misunderstanding with the Rev. Mr. Pierce of that town is vigorous and denunciatory. Today he consented to another interview for THE CALL, in which he said:

"I have known Mr. Pierce for some twenty years and have never in all that time had any trouble with him whatever. This trouble has arisen in the distorted brain of a man who has given his whole life to a people who think everything of him. He has bought their affections by spending all his money upon them. In fact, some years ago he told me that he had then spent thousands of dollars buying tracts and books and distributing them around the country, and such actions will make any man worshipped by his people."

Found Dead Near La Honda.

REDWOOD CITY, CAL., Dec. 31.—John Regan, a pensioner, about 60 years of age, was found dead near his house on the Lawrence Kelly ranch, near La Honda, on Saturday. Regan had a niece named Alice Desmond living in San Francisco some time ago, and a brother, Michael Regan, is now living at Danvers, Mass.

Perished Near Guerneville.

SANTA ROSA, CAL., Dec. 31.—Mervin McCuen, 60 years of age, has been found dead in a lonely place near Guerneville. Death is supposed to have resulted from heart trouble, aggravated by hard work. McCuen was a veteran, receiving a small pension.

Kern County Land Suits Dismissed.

BAKERSFIELD, CAL., Dec. 31.—Seventy-six land suits, known as the Beaumont and Freeman cases, were dismissed in the Superior Court to-day. They have been on the calendar a long time and relate to certificates of purchase of land in the dry part of Kern Lake.

BAKERSFIELD, CAL., Dec. 31.—Mrs. Eliza Hasler of Buttonwillow was brought to a local hospital late last night with a gunshot wound in her left hip, the result of the carelessness of her husband. Hasler is employed by Henry Miller to shoot jackrabbits, and yesterday afternoon before beginning the day's war on the nimble game he was engaged in cleaning his gun. One barrel was accidentally discharged, the charge striking his wife. The wound may prove fatal. The Haslers came here from San Francisco two weeks ago.

BRITAIN'S EMBASSADOR.

J. W. Wurburton, the New Consul-General to San Francisco, is Here.

A TITLE CREATED FOR HIM.

He Was Formerly in Chile and Was for Thirty-Seven Years in the London Foreign Office.

Among the arrivals at the California is the Hon. J. W. Wurburton, the newly appointed Consul-General from Great Britain to San Francisco.

Consul-General Wurburton has come from Chile, where for a year and a half he was Consul-General, and for the last nine months Charge d'Affaires at Valparaiso. Prior to his going to Chile Mr. Wurburton was for thirty-seven years in the Foreign Office at London.

The office of Consul-General is new here, the title of the British representative hitherto being merely Consul. Lord Kimberley, however, in whose department Mr. Wurburton served so long, had a high regard for him because of special services, and created the place for him. He will receive a salary of £1200 a year.

The Consul-General is a medium-sized gentleman of something over 50 years, with hair and mustache tinged with gray. His daughter, Miss Wurburton, accompanies him, and will remain with him here.

General Wurburton told a CALL representative yesterday that he came from Chile via Colon and New York.

"I am very glad to be here," he added. "It is the first time I have ever visited any of the States, and I am very sure from what I have seen that I shall like it here. I will take charge of the office tomorrow, retiring at once Vice-Consul Wellesley Moore, who has been acting since Mr. Donohoe."

"As to the office itself I cannot say anything till I take charge, as I do not exactly yet know the situation, but I think I shall like San Francisco fully as well."

"The whole of Chile is very prosperous now. Ever since the war it has made steady advancement. The last census of Valparaiso, I believe, showed a population of 115,000 people, but I made an estimate when I was there, which if I remember rightly, showed an increase to 130,000."

"There is so much prosperity throughout the republic that you hardly ever see a beggar. It is really phenomenal. Then the climate is all that could be desired. The only slightly bad feature was the earthquakes."

General Wurburton is an Irishman by birth, coming of a very old family in Kings County. His sister is the wife of

BUTTE COUNTY'S FRUITS.

Seventy-Five Carloads of Oranges Will Be Shipped This Season.

New Orchards Coming Into Bearing Supply Work for the Unemployed.

CHICO, CAL., Dec. 31.—Over 9000 boxes of oranges have been shipped from Oroville this season and 7000 from Palermo. It is estimated that about 5000 more will be shipped from both places by the 1st of January. The demand is far in excess of the supply, as the quality of the fruit is very fine. San Francisco takes a great many consignments, and heavy shipments go to Portland and other cities up north. This is equivalent to nearly fifty carloads, and the indications are that not less than seventy-five carloads will be the total season's shipments.

When it is considered that the orange groves of this county are but just coming into bearing, it can be realized what an important industry it will become in a few years. When the trees now on the ground are in bearing there will be a product of not less than 1500 carloads yearly and probably more.

Oranges have brought the growers this year high prices, and there is every indication that this rate will be maintained for several years to come. The fruit is all grown, too, on lands that ten years ago were given up to pasture and the roving coyote. The enterprise and perseverance of a few men have made possible an industry of lasting and continual benefit.

The olive industry in this county is also one of great importance now, and of an idea. The hundreds of acres in these trees along the foothill belt are rapidly coming into bearing, and thousands of gallons of olives are being pickled and packed in barrels. At the present writing the orange and olive orchards give employment to many people at a season of the year when labor is not required in the extensive deciduous orchards in the valley. It may in truth be said that the citrus-fruit growing in the foothills and the deciduous fruits in the valley will make Butte the synonym for wealth and prosperity the world over.

Canneries, packing-houses and preserving-works will insure constant work to large numbers of people at remunerative wages.

Drowned Near Knights Landing.

CHICO, CAL., Dec. 31.—On the last up trip of the steamer Red Bluff Fireman Michael Burns fell overboard and was drowned. It is supposed that he missed his footing or stumbled while walking along the guard and was carried under the steamer, which was then turning a bend of the river. The accident happened about fifteen miles north of Knights Landing.

Fire Near Santa Ana.

SANTA ANA, CAL., Dec. 31.—About 1500 tons of baled hay, owned by Hiram Mayberry of San Jose, and a barn filled with farming implements, near here, burned this afternoon. The loss is about \$3000, with little insurance. Several heads of young cattle also burned.

Accident at Sacramento.

SACRAMENTO, CAL., Dec. 31.—George Hanlon, who has been a farmer in this county for upward of forty years, fell from the top of a gate that he was repairing with little insurance. Several heads of young cattle also burned.

GARROTTED AND ROBBED.

But the Police Think It a Case of Attempted Suicide.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 31.—An old man with a face swollen and distorted by a deadly strangulation was found in the woods, off Sedgwick avenue, last night. A heavy leather strap was buckled tightly about his neck. His eyes bulged from their sockets and his tongue protruded. He had been garrotted and robbed, evidently, for not a cent was found in his pockets. His clothing was of good material and his features, in their distorted condition, showed that the man had been a person of intelligence and refinement.

There was little evidence of a struggle. The man who had been strangled had been easily overcome, apparently. The leather thong was tightly buckled, as if the strength of two men had been required to get the heavy buckle in place. The only clues to the victim's identity were several papers which bore the name "S. S. Mulbert, 112 West Princess street, York

the Earl of Kingston. His uncle, Sir Frederick Stoven, was at the battle of New Orleans. Sir Frederick had the title of Grand Commander of the Bath, and G. C. M. G. He was also for many years Groom in Waiting to the Queen.

Another General Stoven, uncle of the Consul-General's mother, was in the Black Hole of Calcutta. Burke's "County Families of England and Ireland," and "Landed Gentry," trace Consul-General Wurburton's family as far back as the time of the Norman invasion.

The Consul-General's wife is not living. Talking about his family, he said: "I have five daughters and one son. Four of my daughters are married, one in Ireland, two in England, and one the other day in Valparaiso. My youngest daughter is with me, and I hope will remain."

The Consul-General received £500 a year at Valparaiso, with £100 additional, at the suggestion of Lord Kimberley for exceptional services. The appointment to San Francisco is in every way a promotion. The Consul-General is a very pleasant, affable gentleman.

He had many callers yesterday, especially among the British residents, who came to pay their respects to him.

DETERMINED TO WED A PRIEST.

Peculiar Delusion Possessed by a Young Woman.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 31.—Miss Anna Griffin, who is possessed of the delusion that she has been commanded by God to marry Father Govick, priest of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, is detained at the police station at the instance of her relatives. She was arrested Sunday on the steps of the church as she was on her way to claim Father Govick as her own.

On October 26, 1892, Miss Griffin appeared at St. Joseph's Church dressed in the flowing robes of a bride, stating that she was to be married to Father Govick, and it was with great difficulty she was persuaded to leave the church. She was confined in a sanitarium until it was thought she was cured.

As time passed she again became imbued with the same idea, and on January 14, 1894, was again arrested at St. John's, after locking herself in a room and breaking open a window when the door was broken open. She was then committed to the Insane Hospital.

YIELD VERY RICH ORE.

Great Output of Mines in the Cripple Creek District.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Dec. 31.—During the past year the district of Cripple Creek produced over 200,000 tons of gold ore and the valuation is placed at \$3,100,000. Of this amount the Portland mine produced 25,000 tons, with a value of \$1,500,000, and the Independence 12,000 tons that netted the owners \$1,080,000. The average value per ton on all ore shipped went better than \$40. Thousands of tons of low-grade ore still remain on the dumps, for which no profitable method of treatment has yet been discovered.

CHICAGO'S DEATH RATE.

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 31.—The annual report of the city Health Department, which was completed to-day, shows that Chicago has the lowest death rate of any city of 200,000 or more, not excepting any city in the world. The rate, based on the unreviewed figures, is 15.11 for 1000 of population, as compared with 15.24 for last year, less than for any previous year in this city.


