

DR. HUDELSON TELLS HIS CONCLUSIONS

The following quotations, which range from the most moderate to the most extreme, give the common opinions entertained by Mr. Hudelson's society.

He Claims That the Rev. Peter C. Yorke's Purposes Are Political.
