The thirty-fourth Assembly District People's Party Club held its first campaign meeting last night at Mission Opera House.

Public Administrator Freese yesterday took charge of the estate of Emmett Martin Hick, who died intestate on June 7.

Rev. W. W. Bolton leaves this evening for Victoria, en route to explore a wild and uninhabited portion of Vancouver Island.

K. Soroda, president of the Yokohama Specie Bank, gave a banquet at the Palace Hotel last night to thirty-five prominent guests.

John Callaghan has applied for letters of administration on the estate of Sarah Callaghan, whose property is worth about \$1000.

Attorney-General Fitzgerald has advised the regents of the University that the applications for affiliated colleges has not lapsed.

The Market street and several other street-car companies refuse to acknowledge the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission.

Ernest F. Edwards of the Edwards Publishing Company was married to Miss Kathryn Cullinan at 637 Golden Gate avenue last night.

The executive committee of the Carnival of the Golden Gate will probably choose the carnival colors the cardinal, the blue and the gold.

Katherine Breitschneider was yesterday appointed administratrix of the estate of Fritz Breitschneider, whose property is worth \$2350.

Thomas Dolan has applied for letters of administration on the estate of Mary Dolan, who died intestate on June 13, leaving an estate worth \$4000.

Judge Slack yesterday appointed J. H. Sanders guardian of the estate of Rose Freeman, a domestic person, whose property is worth \$6225.

The regents of the university have decided to hold fifty rural meetings in California to educate the college professors and farmers together.

The wrecked Blaimore was raised from her muddy bed yesterday and towed half a mile inshore. She will be righted to-day and pumped out.

The Fish Commission has started A. G. Fletcher off to the Yosemite, where he will distribute 5000 young trout in the lakes and streams of that region.

The Ashlet-Baldwin built developed nothing new yesterday. The depositions of H. C. Chamberlain and E. Hasdin, which have been taken in the county.

Thomas O'Neill and Ed Jones were captured in the bay off Blossom Rock yesterday. They were picked up by the Monticello and transferred to the revenue cutter Hartley.

Mrs. Sadie Nicholson, 116 Eddy street, and her niece, Ella Hasten, were arrested yesterday on the charge of stealing \$215 from C. H. Crocker and Company.

Manual Olivier was convicted of perjury in Judge Belcher's court yesterday. He is the man who swore that Rosie Beady was over 18 years of age in order to get a license to marry her.

In the suit of the Safe Deposit Company to set aside the order of the People's Home Savings Bank, Judge C. H. Jones yesterday appointed J. H. Wait, Director Phelps and others were examined.

Next Sunday the Retail Clerks' Association of this City will hold their annual picnic at Glen Ellen. Half the profits are to be devoted to alleviate the wants of the Fifth-street sufferers.

Labor Commissioner E. L. Fitzgerald has prepared a synopsis of labor laws to be presented to the next Legislature intended for the abolition of the majority of the evils to which labor is now subjected.

Editor James Barry of the Star yesterday gave his opinion on the contempt case of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, in which he compared Judge Catlin to the czar of all the Russias.

General Manager Kruttschnitt of the Southern Pacific Company yesterday announced a commission claimant that no discrimination exists in the fact that 5 cents is charged on the creek-route ferry and 10 cents on the regular route.

The Harbor Commissioners are about to attempt the raising of the Sugar Refinery, Gas Works, Rolling Mills and Union Iron Works by what is known as a "dry dock." The matter has been referred to the board's attorney for a legal opinion.

The committee having in charge the movement to secure the international Christian Endeavor Convention for this City in 1897 is making an active canvass for the \$25,000 pledge required. So far it has met with much encouragement.

Mrs. Nettie Graven appeared before Judge Slack yesterday and was sworn, being thus purged of contempt. The resumed dock were then postponed until Thursday, as the lawyers wanted to go to the Corbett-Sharkey fight to-night.

James H. Garrett, whose wife eloped with Hank Morgan, brother of the State Controller, some time ago, has located his delinquent other half in Ukiah, where she is working as a domestic under the name of Mrs. Wilson. He wants her back.

A suit to quiet title was begun by James L. Angus, Thomas L. Crothers and W. S. Goodfellow against Mrs. Nettie Graven et al. to the Fine and Mission street properties formerly belonging to the late Senator Fair, and for which Mrs. Graven claims a lien.

Five new cotton factories and fourteen new spinning works are being erected in Shanghai, China, says George W. Neill, a broker and land resident of the Chinese seaport, and it is all the result of a great industrial revival since the Sino-Japanese war.

THE CARNIVAL QUEENS

Four Will Probably Be Chosen to Sit Beneath Cardinal, Blue and Gold.

At the meeting of the executive committee Monday of the Carnival of the Golden Gate the proposition submitted for changing 10 cents per vote in the electing of a carnival queen was defeated. It was decided that aspirants to that honor should send in their applications to the executive committee accompanied by vouchers from two business men of good standing. The dates for receiving applications are from July 5 to September 19 at 10 P. M. The executive committee will directly choose the queen from these applications.

There will be probably a queen representing the State of California, one for the City, one for the Fire Department and one for the school-children.

The colors for decorations and badges will probably be a combination of the cardinal of Stanford with the blue and gold of Berkeley, which will be particularly showy and beautiful. These colors were the original suggestions of T. L. Rosenthal.

A prize of \$25 will be paid by the executive committee for the design of the Golden Gate for a design which will embody a week of festivities and be symbolic of San Francisco and its Golden Gate. All drawings must be done in ink and be submitted to the executive committee on or before Monday, July 6, at 4 P. M. The accepted design will become the property of the committee and will be copyrighted. It will figure on all the stationery and badges and be conspicuous in all decorations.

It was deemed advisable to leave the final selection of carnival colors, badges and regalia to the committee which Chairman Warfield appointed as follows: F. A. C. Rappaport, J. J. Brien, W. D. Harper and William Newman.

Owing to his absence from the City Mayor Rathbone resigned and S. H. Friedlander was appointed upon the executive committee on the recommendation of the committee on carnival committees.

The finance committee has prepared 600 circulars for distribution among the leading firms and business houses asking financial assistance.

ESCORTED WITH HONORS

Arrival of the Remains of the Late General W. H. Dimond.

Burial Ceremonies To-Day Under the Direction of the National Guard.

The funeral-car "Woodlawn," bearing the remains of Major-General W. H. Dimond, division commander of the National Guard, arrived at Oakland at 8:45 o'clock last evening. The body was met at the State line beyond Truckee by an escort of staff officers. There Edwin R. Dimond met his brother, Harry Dimond, who was with his father in New York when the latter died. A. Cheesbrough and Colonel T. H. Goodman also went to meet the incoming train.

It is desired by the commanding officer of the Second Brigade that all the men belonging to that unit to the Infantry Regiment should be excused from regular duty at their places of business to-day.

Conrad T. H. Goodman and Charles Wilson will represent George H. Thomas Post No. 2, G. A. R., as pallbearers. Commanding officers of the various regiments of the post have been requested to assemble at the First Presbyterian Church, corner Van Ness avenue and Sacramento street, at 2 P. M.
