CUBAN EXILES HARASS SPAIN. Secret Committees Have Been Discovered in Madrid.

PLOTS OF SEPARATISTS. Insubordination in the Army Fanned by Incendiary Literature.

DESERPTIONS ARE NUMEROUS. Re-enforcements for Weyler Will Be Sent Unarmed as a Precaution Against Mutiny.

LONDON, Eng., July 29.—A dispatch to the Central News from Lisbon says that private advices received from Madrid state that the existence of secret Cuban committees has been discovered there.

As a result of certain acts of insubordination among the last 600 men embarked for Cuba and the discovery that secret proclamations were being circulated among the soldiers, and in view of the notorious reluctance of the troops to go to Cuba, the re-enforcements, 40,000 strong, who will be embarked at the end of August, will be shipped without arms.
