

CASTLE ELECTED IN THE SEVENTH Official Returns Give the Fusion Candidate a Plurality.

Leads Congressman Bowers by About Three Hundred Votes.

DISTRICT COUNT COMPLETED.

The San Diegan Attributes His Defeat to Trades in His Own County.

SAN DIEGO, CAL., Nov. 11.—The official count of election returns for San Diego County was completed to-day, showing Bowers to have 3702 and Castle 3238. Bowers' plurality in the county is, therefore, 464.

Congressman Bowers declines to say whether he will contest the election of his opponent, desiring time to study over the matter. Up to this evening Mr. Bowers had expressed confidence that he was elected, but official returns, showing Castle's plurality to be in the neighborhood of 300, find him a greatly disappointed man.

Bowers attributes his defeat to Judge George Paterbaugh, who ran independently of the Superior judgeship, after failing to secure a renomination, thus, it is believed, drawing many votes away from the regular ticket by combinations effected by his friends.

PROTEST THE VETERANS' VOTE.

Los Angeles Democrats Will Sue to Have Soldiers' Home Ballots Thrown Out.

LOS ANGELES, CAL., Nov. 11.—The Bryanites here, smarting under defeat and the loss of election bets to the amount of many thousands of dollars on Los Angeles County, have retained Brooks & Trask, lawyers, to institute proceedings including the vote of the Soldiers' Home, on the ground that, as wards of the Government, the veterans had no legal right to vote.

Bryan's Plurality Over McLaughlin Exceeds Seven Hundred.

McKinley's Plurality in Oregon.

PORTLAND, OR., Nov. 11.—There has been no change reported in the vote in this State from that published, except a slightly increased Bryan plurality (255 instead of 187) in Harney County. This leaves McKinley's plurality in the State 2367. The election of McKinley and Hobart was celebrated to-night by an immense ratification meeting and parade in drizzling rain, with some 5000 people in line.

OREGON PEOPLE DECEASED. Loaned Money to a Man Who Claimed He Owned Rich Mines.

PORTLAND, OR., Nov. 11.—John Parker, 75 years old, representing himself as part owner of the Lucky Hill Mining Company in Nevada, swindled Morris Carr of this city out of \$275 and then fled to Chicago. It is believed he has swindled others in Portland and Oregon towns. His method was to exhibit letters from the mines, telling of wonderfully rich developments. Then after Parker had worked himself well into the acquaintance of men and secured the loan of a few hundred dollars on his personal note. This shielded him from criminal prosecution when the victim discovered that he had been duped, and the only recourse Carr and others had is the civil courts. The police informed Carr they could do nothing for him.

THE FORMOSA REBELLION. No Prospect of an Early Cessation of Hostilities.

SEATTLE, WASH., Nov. 11.—The Kinshu Maru, the third vessel of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, arrived in port this evening from Japan, bringing with it a cargo of teas, silks and general merchandise. It will return with a cargo of about 3000 tons, including 1,000,000 pounds of Texas cotton.

THE NEWS OF SAN JOSE.

Mrs. Emma L. Parker Wins Her Contest for a Fortune.

A Jury Declares That Her Father-in-Law's Last Testament Is Invalid.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Nov. 11.—The will of the late George H. Parker was broken today, and as it now stands Mrs. Emma L. Parker, the widow of Edward L. Parker, the only son of the testator, will secure the whole estate, which is valued at \$150,000. The verdict was that Parker was of unsound mind at the time the will and both of its codicils were made.

PROPOSED HIGH SCHOOL SITE.

Scheme to Erect the Structure on the State Normal Grounds.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Nov. 11.—An effort will be made to have the new \$75,000 high school erected on part of the grounds surrounding the State Normal School. The land was originally given the State by the city for school purposes, and as it is more than the State can properly care for it is believed the State will be willing to deed a part of it back to the city.

His Cunning Results in Imprisonment.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Nov. 11.—Francisco Angelo, who gave an alarm of fire in an Italian lodging-house on North Fifth street Monday night and then ran off with a pair of trousers and \$50 belonging to Bruno Aversa, was arraigned before Justice Gass to-day on a charge of grand larceny. He pleaded not guilty, and his examination was for to-morrow morning. He was remanded to the custody of the Sheriff in default of \$1000 bail.

Livermore Horstchief Caught.

SAN JOSE, CAL., Nov. 11.—Jose Salazar, an ex-convict, was arrested at Gilroy yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Rives for stealing a horse and cart at Livermore on Monday. He had the outfit with him when captured. Salazar was taken to Livermore to-day. He is also wanted at Fresno for stealing two horses and a buggy. He was sentenced to five years in State Prison. In 1881 he was sent up from this county for six years for horse-stealing.

Seattle Single-Taxers.

SEATTLE, WASH., Nov. 11.—Three hundred single-taxers met in this city last night and decided to prosecute a systematic single-tax campaign, beginning operations at once, similar to that carried on in Delaware. A propaganda committee of fifteen was appointed with instructions to organize clubs in each of the State's 800 postoffice districts.

Fatal Accident at Colusa.

COLUSA, CAL., Nov. 11.—Albert Shaffer, while hunting in a boat to-day, was knocked out of the craft by the rebound of his gun when it was discharged, and was drowned before help could reach him. He was about 21 years of age and unmarried. The body was recovered three hours after the accident.

McKinley's Victory Was Napa's.

NAPA, CAL., Nov. 11.—Napa's manufacturing interests are opening up brightly since the election. About 200 men have gone to work, the principal establishments being the Sawyer Tannery and glove factory.

STORY OF THE CRIME RETOLD.

CAHOTO, CAL., Nov. 11.—The sheriff's officers returned to Usal to-night, having failed to effect the capture of Smith and Noble, the last of the quartet suspected of complicity in the murder of rancher John Mudgett. Deputy Sheriffs Hart and Day say they have not yet been able to locate and do not anticipate any great difficulty in effecting their capture.

NEW WHATCOM, WASH., Nov. 11.—Charles Lane, one of the best-known gamblers in the West, committed suicide here last night by drinking an overdose of acetone. He was a graduate in law from Harvard and practiced law in earlier life. He had a sister in St. Louis. Financial troubles caused his despondency.

Captured at Yreka.

MARYSVILLE, CAL., Nov. 11.—Sherman Quinn, who with Edward Robinson disposed of twenty-four stolen Oregon cattle here ten days ago, was to-day arrested at Yreka. Sheriff Donahoe left to-night to take the prisoners into custody and bring him to Marysville for trial.

Stanford's Growing Registration.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, CAL., Nov. 11.—Registrar Elliott says that the total enrollment of students up to date is 1601 for this semester. At this rate the year's enrollment will considerably exceed that of any former year in the university's history.

ORDERED FROM NARE ISLAND. The Flagship Philadelphia Will Go to South America.

VALLEJO, CAL., Nov. 11.—The United States flagship Philadelphia, now in dry-dock at the navy-yard, is under orders to go to South America, the objective points being Callao and Valparaiso. In view of this fact, Admiral Beardslee-commander-in-chief of the squadron, has limited all leaves of absence to officers to short periods. The cruiser will be ready to leave the yard for San Francisco in about two weeks. The admiral will then transfer his flag, now flying on the Bennington, to the Philadelphia and go south to the Pacific. The Bennington will then come to the yard for docking and minor repairs.

HEARD TOGETHER FROM VANCOUVER.

PORTLAND, OR., Nov. 11.—Three years ago William Davrey, the owner of a farm near Vancouver, Wash., went to Arizona to engage in mining, a pursuit in which he believed he could do more readily than a mortgage resting upon his place. Davrey at that time was about 32 years old. He left behind two children and a wife, whom he had reason to believe was both loving and faithful.

It appears that Davrey succeeded fairly well, for, from time to time, he remitted money to his wife to assist in freeing his farm from debt. Recently Mrs. Davrey received a \$300 draft from her husband for that purpose, and in reply she wrote to him that she would no longer consider herself his wife, and asked his advice as to what disposition should be made of their children. He at once took his departure from Arizona for home, but when he reached Vancouver, two days ago, his wife was not there to bid him welcome. He learned that the last \$300 he remitted had not been applied to the part cancellation of the mortgage upon his farm, but that the faithless woman had appropriated it to her own use.

The detective husband stated that he had no further use for his runaway wife, but all he wanted was his little girl and the \$300 his wife had robbed him of. DIES WHILE ON DUTY.

Heart Disease Kills a Sailor as He Works Overhead.

ASTORIA, OR., Nov. 11.—Captain Jones of the British bark Cambrian Princess, which arrived in port to-day 113 days from Santos, reports the death at sea of Able Seaman Charles Martin under most singular circumstances. Martin and the boatswain were securing the gaskets when taking the gaskets as they were thrown to him. Suddenly the seaman ceased to work and the boatswain inquired the cause. No reply was received and the boatswain proceeded to investigate. Martin was found lying across the yard mottled. Again the boatswain asked what was the matter and then, placing his hand on the silent figure, he discovered that death had claimed a victim. A rope was fastened around the body and it was lowered to the deck. Heart disease was the cause of death.

ALASKA'S GOLD OUTPUT.

Production for the Present Year Estimated at \$4,670,000.

SEATTLE, WASH., Nov. 11.—G. B. Swinehart, editor of the Alaska Mining Record, of Juneau, has compiled mining data showing the gold output of Alaska for 1896 to be \$4,670,000, as against \$3,000,000 for 1895. Southeastern Alaska quartz yielded \$2,355,000. Cooks Inlet, placer, \$190,000; Klondike, \$2,125,000. The Breck Creek-Circle City district alone produced \$1,300,000. During the year eighty-five stamps were added, making a total stamp capacity of 540 for all Alaska. Placers rich in total amount, \$2,600,000. Swinehart estimates the 1897 output at \$6,000,000.

Oregon Asylum Case Decided.

SALEM, OR., Nov. 11.—The Supreme Court yesterday handed down its third opinion in the branch asylum case, and this time affirmed the judgment of the lower court in restraining the State Treasurer from honoring the \$25,000 warrants issued in payment for a site for the proposed asylum building in Eastern Oregon. The court holds that payment of warrants would be a misapplication of public money because the constitution prohibited the location of a public institution at any place other than the capital.

For a Lake County Railway.

NAPA, CAL., Nov. 11.—An enthusiastic mass-meeting was held in the courthouse last evening and addressed by the county prominent in projecting an electric road through Lake County. It is proposed not only to build the road, but supply power to manufacturers from Lakeport to Vallejo. Capital has been procured to undertake the enterprise, the only guarantee to be given by the people residing along the road being that they will give a stated amount of patronage.

Stockton's Man's Awful Death.

STOCKTON, CAL., Nov. 11.—Thomas McDowell was scalded to death last night at the gas-house in this city. Shortly before 2 o'clock shrieks were heard by some of the employees of the gas-house, and following the sound they found McDowell lying in a helpless condition near the engine. He had wandered into the yard near the big engine-room to sleep, and had fallen near the mouth of the steam exhaust pipe. When the steam was turned on he stumbled still further along into a tub of water and out of that onto a bed of red-hot coals. Physicians were summoned, but their efforts were of no avail, and he died soon after his removal to his home on East Anderson street.

Santa Barbara's Gain.

SANTA BARBARA, CAL., Nov. 11.—A reaction in business is felt here since the election of McKinley. Among the projects which had been slumbering for some time was one for the construction of a large bathhouse. This has been revived and the necessary funds assured for its completion. By order of the Board of Trade the architect has perfected the plans, which will soon be in the hands of the contractor, including Santa Barbara one of the finest bathhouses on the coast.
