LONDON, Eng., March 31.—Major Sir John W. Loughby, who, together with Dr. L. S. Jameson, Major White, Colonel H. F. White, Colonel Gray and Captain Coventry, was convicted of participating in the Jameson raid into the Transvaal, was released from Holloway jail this morning, his term of ten months' imprisonment having expired.
