


CITY NEWS IN BRIEF.



STABLE IS STRUGGLING.

More Technical Objections Made Against the Indictments.

Accusations of the Taking of County Hospital Furniture Are Clearly Set Forth.

Dr. Frederick H. Stable resumed his struggle in the Superior Court yesterday to defeat the effort to convict him for embezzling property belonging to the City and County of San Francisco. He was arraigned on the two indictments recently presented against him, and pleaded not guilty.

It will be remembered that when Dr. Stable was first indicted his attorney, Edgar D. Peixoto, demurred to the form of the accusation, and accordingly new indictments were drawn up and presented by the Grand Jury. The remodeled documents are very explicit. The first accuses Dr. Stable with "willfully, unlawfully, feloniously and fraudulently" appropriating to his own use seventy-seven yards of Brussels carpet and eighty-five yards of carpet lining, worth \$102.60. An explanation was made by the accused touching this carpet that was accepted as satisfactory by many of his friends. He said that his own carpets had been put down in place of the ones he took, and that he thought he was entitled to make the exchange.

The second indictment deals with another state of affairs, however. It sets forth that Dr. Stable embezzled the following described personal property belonging to the municipal government: 1 sofa, covered with broadcloth silk, worth \$50; 1 corner chair, \$35; 1 gilt chair, \$15; 1 rocker, \$12; 1 fancy table, \$20; 1 broadcloth silk table-cover, \$10; 1 hamper, \$7; 1 chiffonier-cover, broadcloth silk, \$5; 1 reading-table, \$10. Total, \$176.

Mr. Peixoto filed a formal notice of a motion to set aside the indictment on the usual technical grounds, and the principal points being that the Grand Jury and for challenging individual members of that body; it is also alleged that persons were illegally allowed in the Grand Jury room.

Assistant District Attorney Hosmer consented to a delay of a few days for the purpose of examining the grand jurors as to their alleged bias, and it was agreed that the trial should take place some time in August.
