and wherever I went throughout the East, and in fact pretty much over the country, except in the Northwest mining regions.

Arrival of a Dignified Oriental Who Is Heir to a Prefecture in Che-Kiang.

Yeung Wai Pan of the Chinese embassy, Washington, D. C., accompanied by his wife, two little sons, and Secretary Fun Kwai Leung and Yeung Yik Look, of the legation, came off the steamer "Copied" yesterday and went to the Occidental.

Yeung Wai Pan may be Consul-General at this port. He said through his interpreter:

"I may be Consul-General at San Francisco, but cannot yet tell, as I must first go to Washington, for which place I will leave in a few days, or as soon as myself, family and attendants get rested from the long journey by sea."

Mr. Yung is a native of Kwang Tung, he is heir to a prefecture or judgeship in Che-Kiang. He is 30 years of age and is a heavy-built, ruddy-faced, handsome man.

His secretary, Fun, is an Australian by birth and speaks English fluently.


