Death of Alvan Clark, the Famous Maker of Lenses.

Was Decorated by the French Academy for Astronomical Discoveries.

Made the Lick Lens and Had Just Completed the Yerkes Glass for Geneva.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 9.—Professor Alvan G. Clark, the famous telescope lens manufacturer, died at his home here today of a stroke of apoplexy.

NO ULTIMATUM TO HAWAII YET

Wild Diplomatic Rumors Strongly Denied in Honolulu.

Prolonged Conference Between Shimamura and Minister Cooper.

Studying Piles of Official Papers and Books on International Law and Precedent.

HONOLULU, HAWAII, June 2.—There is nothing new in the Japanese matter, except that Minister Shimamura and Minister of Foreign Affairs Cooper have been holding two-hour conferences at the executive building for the past three mornings.

It may be stated positively, however, that Hawaii will not under any condition back down from her present situation, which is a positive refusal to recognize the right of Japan to demand indemnity for returned immigrants or to give any assurance that similar proceedings will not be taken against future shipments of the same class.

Your correspondent at once sought Minister Cooper and was assured by him that the rumor was not true. Questioned as to the progress of negotiations, the Minister of Foreign Affairs said that a protracted conference was going on between himself and the Japanese representative who is taking over the matter to end.

Papers from the Orient yesterday informed their readers that the Hawaiian Government was going to choose the King of Norway and Sweden as a mediator in the immigration case.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 9.—The venerable Senator Morrill of Vermont, chairman of the Finance Committee, was in the Senate today, after an illness of some weeks.

A concurrent resolution offered by Allen of Nebraska was agreed to, nationalizing the Trans-Mississippi Exposition to be held at Omaha, and requesting the President to invite foreign nations to participate.

A joint resolution on the same general subject was agreed to, suspending the immigration and Chinese exclusion laws so as to permit foreign labor to take charge of foreign exhibits at the Trans-Mississippi Exposition.

On the rice paragraph Allison, in charge of the bill, withdrew the committee amendments reducing the House rates, thus leaving the House rates stand.

Paraguay 231 on tobacco had been struck out by the Senate. On the question of agreeing to this change Rawlins of Utah took the floor to answer Vesli's statement yesterday.

Lindsay of Kentucky, platform in hand, interrupted to ask Rawlins, since he presented the tariff clause, why the good old Democratic word "only" after tariff for revenue came to be omitted.

BEER AND TEA ESCAPE. There Will Be No Additional Tax on These Commodities.
