



CAUGHT COLLIS NAPPING. Commercial Travelers Think They Have Apprehended the Southern Pacific Making Illegal Discriminations.

The commercial travelers think that they have caught the Southern Pacific Railroad Company in a trap.

The history of the story is this: On September 1 the Valley road put into effect a special 1000-mile rate of \$25 and a 2000-mile rate of \$40.

These announcements were to the effect that the company would now issue a 2000-mile ticket for \$40, good only between Stockton and Bakersfield and San Francisco and Lathrop.

This is the clause upon which the commercial travelers base their legal objections.

By law a rate once reduced to meet competition cannot be raised again.

This is the problem that the Commercial Travelers' Association now hopes to have solved to the advantage of its members.

WHO TEACHES THE VICES?

A Chinese Preacher Lays the Blame on the Whites.

Second Day's Session of the Central Baptist Association.

Many Interesting Reports Made by Workers From All Parts of the State.

While the local Chinese are generally credited with a full knowledge of all the vices known to the white man and are accused of having imported a new extra one, the wily Mongolian is of a somewhat different opinion.

Mr. Fong did not specify what the vices were, but remarked that he had heard considerable talk about sending missionaries to China, which seemed a little foolish to him, as missionaries are just as badly needed in the heart of this city, not only among Chinese, but also the whites, who teach us many vices unknown in our own country.

The remarks of the Chinese divine occasioned much comment, but other members of the association, who have done missionary work in the Chinese colony, heartily indorsed every word he said.

The morning session opened with the report of C. F. Baker on Sunday-schools. Mr. Baker deplored the lack of attendance at Sunday-schools and recommended the preaching of special sermons to children, at which parents should feel it to be their duty to be in attendance and bring the little one with them.

Rev. J. George Johnson made a general report for the publication society, which was as follows:

It may be doubted if we take as great an interest in this society as we should. It prints Bibles and tracts by the millions, and while it sells its books to make the business pay, it supplies many of our Sunday-schools and churches with Bibles and religious helps free of charge.

At noon all adjourned to the church parlors, where a hot dinner was served by the members of the Ladies' Aid Society.

The report on foreign missions, read by Rev. C. M. Hill, urged that since foreign missions are being to the association they deserve a large part in the thought of the convention, and that since the people of God have no larger enterprise on their hands than that of christianizing the world, it naturally follows that thought must be given to the enterprise if success is to be obtained.
