EVERYTHING WILL BE FUNGATED.


Vessel and Crew Will Be Taken to the Angel Island Station by a Tug To-Day.

The bark left Acapulco for San Francisco forty-two days ago, and soon afterward one of the sailors was taken down with the disease.



A big fleet of deep-water vessels reached port yesterday. The Cawdor and Orient, on which reinsurance was paid, and the Imperator from Acapulco, with yellow fever aboard, were in company off the Farallones.

COLLISIONS IMMINENT IN THE FOG

The British Bark Inverlyon Nearly Went on the Farallones.

A CATASTROPHE AVERTED IN TIME.

Insurance Men Made Happy by the Arrival of Five Overdue Vessels.

ALL OF THEM HAD BEEN RE-INSURED.

An Ex-Baseball Manager, Wanted in Honolulu, Worked His Way Here as an A. E.

Five vessels on which reinsurance has been paid have reached port in safety, much to the joy of the speculators, and there is now only one to be heard from. On the Heathbank, seventy-eight days from Hongkong, 10 guineas per cent was paid; on the Cawdor, 144 days from Swansea, 12 1/2 guineas; on the Orient, 201 days from Newcastle, England, 12 1/2 guineas; on the Shenadoah, 163 days from Baltimore, 5 guineas, and on the Inverlyon, seventy-three days from Newcastle, Australia, 5 guineas per cent was paid.

COMMERCIAL TRAVELERS SPLIT UP

So-Called "Inner Circle" Engenders Much Ill-Feeling.

California Commercial Travelers' Association the Order's Name.

J. A. MERSHON ELECTED PRESIDENT. They Still Declare Allegiance to the Old Association—Causes of the Trouble.

The San Francisco Commercial Travelers' Association is suffering the throes of civil war. They deny it in public with a hearty "amen," but in the very thought of such a thing but that is just what it amounts to, and there are several, among them men that have engineered the scheme, who are willing to admit that such is virtually the case.

The result of the trouble is that another organization has been formed, to be known as the California Commercial Travelers' Association. All those belonging are members of the older organization, and that fact is the cause of the whole bitterness.

In the first place the members of the new association assert that the old was organized on a paper for the old. But there are other things to be taken into consideration.

At the last election of officers two candidates were put forward, namely: Emmett Dunn, who is alleged to be in sympathy with the old, and Alexander McDonald, who is "believed" not to be. J. A. Mershon was placed forward as an independent candidate at the last moment, in hopes of breaking the slate, but the time was too short for lobbying.

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In brief the new association will secure downtown offices, hang out its banner and proceed to do business as a new stand along new lines. Although the membership at present can consist of only twenty it may be found convenient to extend the limit to thirty-five or forty.

Many are opposed on any extension of the membership, however, and it may be found politic to let it remain as it is.

And now that new association begins to show the real contempt it feels for the old by asserting that it intends to acquire lines of valuable goods, and whenever a member loses his position he will be put to work selling them.

It is not true that the eyes of the present generation of the American people are any more defective than those of their ancestors.
