

SPLASHY SPORT AT THE TRACK

Bettors Landed on the Mud Larks and the Ring Quit Loser.

Rey El Santa Anita, the Derby Winner, Beaten Out by Coupon III.

Three First Choices Annexed Purses at Ingleside—Miss Lynch a Very Useful Piece of Horseflesh.

Though a most disagreeable day at the track, the usual attendance of the "faithful" saw five shows of racing at Ingleside. The sou'wester whistled and screamed through the grand stand and everybody went about under closely reefed sails.

Rey El Santa Anita, winner of an American derby, was started in the opening mile run and suffered defeat. He was rightfully made a pronounced favorite on his class, but was allowed to loaf along by Hennessy and at the end was beaten out a length by Coupon III, the 8 to 5 second choice, ridden by H. Martin.

M. F. Tarpey's shifty imp, Islington filly Nova, donned a large gathering of two-year-old talent in the six-furlong sprint which followed. The good price of 4 to 1 was always obtainable about her, and soon showing in front she led William out with ease by a couple of lengths.

Miss Lynch, the last daughter of Faustus, carrying W. B. Jennings' colors, defeated Scotch Rose, Leora and a trio of two-year-olds like breaking sticks. She was extensively backed at 6 to 5, and won in a canter from Bliss Rucker. The latter colt was away badly, and stationed the place from Scotch Rose the last jump.

The mile and a sixteenth event was declared off, and a six-furlong dash with a field of nine substituted in its place. Myrtle, with Thorpe in the saddle, was quickly played down from 3 to 2 to 4 to 5, and in a very close finish got the verdict from the fast-moving Schiller by a scant head. Charles A. a 100 to 1 shot, stumbled into the lead.

The heavy going proved too tiresome traveling for dainty little Tea Rose, the 9 to 5 choice for the seven-furlong run, which concluded the day's sport, and after running in second position the stretch she ended up fourth at the wire. Fleury de Lis, away well, had all kinds of speed, and led Sweet William past the finishing post by a length, with Etta H a good third.

Lincoln II and All Over have again been placed in training by Sam Hildreth. B. J. Johnson, who has first start at the meeting with the Putrocar. He is a very snifty colt when right.

Little Meany is evidently going to make a name for himself in the saddle, when he flat-footed in the bar, when which did not materially bet their chance.

Rey El Santa Anita looks well and should win his next start out. The stable evidently did not fancy him yesterday.

J. E. Hesketh, who was arrested early Sunday morning for robbing Daniel Fleming, a teamster, at Fifth and Perry streets, had another charge of robbery booked against him yesterday.

Emil Ney, an ex-policeman, was knocked down and robbed of his gold watch and chain on Market street on Saturday night, November 6, and reported the robbery to the police.

Yesterday he went to Judge Campbell's court, where the preliminary examination of Hesketh and his companion, Donovan, was being held. He identified Hesketh as the man who robbed him, and so notified the police, as soon as Hesketh was taken back to the City Prison he was booked on the charge.

IS NOW OIL INSPECTOR. Dockery Gains a New Title by Having Olive Oil Analyzed.

Grocers Will Be Arrested Who Sold Adulterations for the Pure Article.

For the past few days Milk Inspector Dockery has been taking and having tested samples of a preparation sold by various local grocers for pure olive oil and has thereby added another title to his already exceedingly long list.

Some of the samples taken proved to be a mixture of cotton and mustard seed oils and were invariably sold as the pure article. Warrants were sworn to yesterday by Dockery for the arrest of fourteen grocery firms.
