THE MATTER NOT BEYOND THE STAGE OF RUMOR

Yet. The Matter Not Beyond the Stage of Rumor. The skeleton in the closet of the family of Mrs. Herman P. Rulfs, corner of Hayes and Laguna streets, has come to light through the action of the mother in swearing to a warrant before Judge Low last Saturday for the arrest of Frederick Winkelmann, her son, on a charge of treason against life.

Although the warrant was issued on Saturday, no effort has been made to arrest the young man and yesterday afternoon, accompanied by his attorney, he appeared before Judge Low to surrender himself, thinking that the Judge would release him on his own recognizance after hearing the circumstances.

The Judge refused to do so and Winkelmann and his attorney left to secure bonds before surrendering himself. The Judge's refusal was based upon the case of William McLeod, who was released by him on his own recognizance on a similar charge and went home and checked his wife to death.

Winkelmann's father, it appears, died about five years ago, leaving an estate consisting of real property on Hayes and Laguna streets valued at about \$20,000. The widow afterward obtained an order from the Probate Court to homestead the property, having placed its value at only \$5000.

The family lived together in peace and harmony until about eighteen months ago, when the mother, who was a devout Episcopalian, her children, married Herman P. Rulfs, a young man, and started him in a grocery business in a store on the property.

The introduction into the family of the young stepfather has been followed by acrimony and unpleasantness, and the children are anxious to have the property relieved from the homestead order, which Frederick inherited from the mother, and divided among them.

A petition will be presented to that effect to the Probate Court probably to-day, and meantime Fred will insist upon his right to the property, and the charges it makes in being prosecuted, as he wants the real facts to be known. It is understood that Mrs. Rulfs has regretted her action in obtaining the warrant and is anxious to have it withdrawn.

Had Lost Jurisdiction. The Superior Court received a setback at the hands of the Supreme Court yesterday in the case of George Quatrolo, who asked to be released from the custody of Sheriff Whelan on a writ of habeas corpus.

The woman was divorced from her husband, Edward J. Quatrolo, and the children were awarded to her. Later the court modified the decree and gave the children to the father, and the mother, in contempt. The Supreme Court held that the appeal stayed all proceedings and suspended the writ of habeas corpus.
