General William Sooy Smith, the long-expected foundation expert, whose advent has been eagerly looked forward to by all those interested in the new postoffice building to be erected at Seventh and Mission streets, was seen last night at the Palace, where he had just arrived from Chicago.

General Smith has been sent out here by Superintendent Architect Taylor, the head of the Government Architectural Bureau, to investigate the report recently submitted by Superintendent Robert of this city, wherein it was explained that after all the excavations had been made and while the contractors were getting ready to lay the concrete foundations a bed of quicksand was discovered at the extreme southern corner of the lot, which made any further continuation of the work useless.

General Smith will thoroughly investigate the matter from the standpoint of an expert, and after looking carefully into the difficulty will try to devise some means whereby it may be overcome.

The general, who acquired his right to that title during the Civil War, is considered the best authority on matters architectural, particularly that portion of the science relating to foundations, in the United States.

Among other celebrated pieces of work of that nature done by him was the laying of the foundations of Chicago's Auditorium and Title and Trust building.

He is also the owner of the Butch system of dealing with quicksand, which he uses so successfully in the construction of the Sault Ste. Marie locks, between Lake Superior and Lake Huron.

The Butch system is to put down a pipe into the sand through which a congealing mixture is poured which freezes them solid. Then the solid mass is bored through to the bedrock on which the foundations are commenced.
