

MARTIN TO BE MAYOR OF SAN JOSE

Victory Rests With the People's Municipal Ticket.

Rea's Forces Win by Organized Work at the Polls.

Despite the Deep Interest, the Election Passes Off Quietly.

MAJORITIES ARE SMALL.

Charter Club Gets a Councilman and Several Members of the Appointing Board.

SAN JOSE, April 11.—The day was the warmest of the year, the thermometer climbing up to 85. Business was practically suspended, as all interest was centered on the battle at the ballot boxes. The polls were opened on time all over the city, and at each voting place crowds of workers were present. It was noticed that the "gang" forces were everywhere in evidence in large numbers. At some precincts as many as twenty and twenty-five "gang" workers were present, where only one or two men were doing work for the Charter Club.

While there was much interest in the main, the election was a quiet one. A number of challenges were made at various polling places and these nearly always caused some delay and led to some excitement. In the First Ward W. T. Nolting, a "gang" member of the Council, made himself conspicuous by his bulldozing tactics and came near getting a serious drubbing for interfering with the wrong man. At the Third Precinct J. M. Stevens was arrested for illegal voting. It is claimed that he voted in one precinct while living in another.

"Hire" men on the street begging and threatening for votes. His henchmen, John and Andrew MacKenzie, were also begging votes, showing how serious they considered the fight against the corrupt rule.

Undoubtedly the best organized work done during the day at the polls was done by the "Gang" forces. In this they had much the better of the Charter Club people.

Complete returns from thirteen precincts, and incomplete returns from the remaining seven precincts, indicate that the entire People's municipal ticket except Councilman in the Fourth and two or three members of the Appointing Board, is elected by majorities ranging from 200 to 400.

The ticket elected is as follows: Mayor, C. J. Martin; Clerk, J. W. Cook; Treasurer, J. N. Ewing; Councilmen-at-large, J. D. Miner; Councilmen: First Ward, J. W. McAuley; Second Ward, H. Ward Wright; Third Ward, Henry M. N. Young.

On the Appointing Board those back of the People's ticket will elect, probably, Paul P. Austin, Henry Bookin Sr., Milton Campbell, E. E. Chase, H. J. Fikes, F. D. Hartman, Hugh McCormack, James C. Secrest, Francis E. Spencer, Frank Stock, C. D. Wright.

The Charter Club will elect Edmond Coopers for the Council in the Fourth Ward, and probably Lawrence Archer, T. Edgar and E. A. Auzerais on the Appointing Board.

The total vote polled in the entire city aggregated 4961, and was the largest ever polled in a city election in San Jose.



GASOLINE-STOVE EXPLOSION CAUSES A WOMAN'S DEATH

Neighbors Attracted by the Cries of Mrs. R. A. Long of Hanford Find Her Enveloped by Flames.

FRESNO, April 11.—Mrs. R. A. Long, sister-in-law of Coroner Long of this city, was burned to death at her home in Hanford this afternoon. She was in the kitchen ironing, when a gasoline stove exploded. The oil covered her clothes and set the house on fire instantly. Flames enveloped the unfortunate woman from head to foot. She was alone and ran from the house screaming for help. Neighbors heard her cries and ran to her assistance. Flames enveloped Mrs. Long, and she was running about in a frantic manner and screaming with pain. The clothing burned fiercely about her head and body, scorching the flesh horribly. The neighbors procured blankets and tried to extinguish the flames, but their efforts were made too late. When the fire was finally extinguished she was carried to the house of a neighbor, where she received every attention. She survived the frightful accident only an hour, however, dying at 5:30 o'clock. Dr. Long of this city left immediately for Hanford upon receipt of the shocking news. The woman's husband is R. A. Long, and he conducts a transfer business in Hanford. Mrs. Long was 30 years of age and had three children.

ELECTIONS IN MANY TOWNS

Local Issues Decided by the Ballots of Californians.

Result in Sausalito Probably Means a Return of Poolrooms.

Bond Propositions Made the Issue at Several Points—Party Lines Not Drawn.

SAUSALITO, April 11.—The largest vote ever cast at a town election was polled to-day. The following were the successful candidates: Adolph Silva and Jacques Thomas, Trustees for long term; Dr. H. J. Crumpton, Trustee for short term; John A. Hannon, Marshal; F. D. Linsley, Treasurer, and Joseph H. Fryer, Clerk.

This result undoubtedly means the licensing of poolrooms in Sausalito this year. The fight was made on this issue, and the Trustees elected were known to favor the proposition. Each received overwhelming majorities. The following is the vote in full, 251 ballots cast: Trustees—A. Silva, 272; Jacques Thomas, 285; H. J. Crumpton, 215; J. T. Harnes, 61; O. C. Miller, 41; W. C. Morrow, 25. Clerk—Joseph H. Fryer, 182; William Millard, 111; William Harold, 59. Treasurer—F. D. Linsley, 144; Antonio Lawrence, 117; John Silver, 81. Marshal—John A. Hannon, 297; John E. Creed, 84; Paul Trouette, 43.

ST. HELENA, April 11.—An exciting municipal election was held here to-day. The principal contest was for Marshal and Treasurer. For Marshal, J. G. Johnson, who has held the office for the past eight years, polled 22 votes for J. F. Chorus's 12. For Treasurer, W. A. Elgin, the incumbent, received 18 and G. H. Schmidt 15. For Clerk, Otto Behrens was re-elected with a vote of 125 for J. C. Nixon, and 43 for W. L. Phillips. For Town Trustee, G. C. Fountain, a prominent mercantile, P. E. Grant and E. G. Schuman were elected. Dr. Dawson, Rev. James Mitchell and Dr. Samuel McCurdy were chosen without opposition for library trustees.

NO INJURY TO SCAVENGERS

Mayor Phelan Explains the Provisions of the New Resolution.

Veto of the Contract for Repairing Third Street Pavement.

Devany Determined to Put a Stop to Slot Machines Used by Saloons and Cigar Stands.

Mayor Phelan has addressed a communication to the Scavenger's Union, in reply to their petition requesting him to veto the order passed by the Supervisors at their last meeting, in which he denies that the order is prejudicial to their business or that it will injure the scavengers in any manner. The Mayor states that the Board of Health will not require the use of any particular make of carts, but will only insist upon garbage wagons being water-tight and covered. Regarding the resolution passed declaring in favor of a tax levy to enable the board to enter into a contract for the removal of garbage at the city's expense, Mayor Phelan informs the union that the proper course to take is to protest to the board next September, when the levy is made, or else secure the contract itself for its members.

At yesterday's meeting of the board the Mayor presented his veto to the resolution awarding the contract for repairing the bituminous pavement on Third street, between Mission and Howard, to Flinn & Treacy. This is the job recently exposed by The Call, when the Supervisors ignored the bid of J. J. Dowling of \$75 and awarded the contract to Flinn & Treacy at \$225. When Dowling's bid was called to the attention of the board, Supervisor Britt said that Dowling had bid for the work under a misapprehension. The matter went over until last week, when Dowling was called upon for an explanation. His statement was lamely weak, but the board accepted it and awarded the contract to the other firm. In his veto message, the Mayor admitted before the Board of Supervisors that if the contract were awarded to him he would do the work, and I recommend that it be so awarded.

Devany offered an amendment to the resolution providing for the licensing of slot machines, which is to prohibit the licensing of all such machines having winners in drinks, cigars or their equivalent. The effect of this order would be to abolish all such machines, which is Devany's object. The matter was referred to the License Committee.

The Equitable Gas Light Company filed a petition with the National Surety Company, as a guarantee for properly repairing the following streets after laying mains thereon: Stockton, from Sutter south and across Market; Post, from Stockton east to and across Montgomery; Sutter street, same.

The board passed a resolution to suspend the one-twelfth act, so as to admit of expenditures being provided and paid for the lighting of public buildings, owing to the insufficiency of the fund for that purpose. The deficiency is \$14,000. It was decided to authorize the clerk to advertise for bids for repairing all bituminous streets for a term of two years, consisting of Dr. H. H. Davis, Frederick T. Duhring and G. S. Harris, was elected. John Young was elected by the other officers, which did not hinge on the water question.

APPROVED BY ITS PARTISANS

Sacramento Republicans Indorse the Central Committee.

Action Increasing Membership Is Received With Favor.

Designed to Afford a Representative for Each Polling Place in the City.

SACRAMENTO, April 11.—The action of the County Central Committee whereby the membership was increased from eleven to seventeen has met the general approbation of prominent Republicans in this city. The design of the committee was to meet as far as possible the provisions of the Stratton primary law recently declared by the Supreme Court to be defective. While the purposes of the law are defeated by the decision there is no doubt that many of its features were indorsed by the people generally, and to meet that sentiment the committee took the action it did.

Under the Stratton primary law there were a greater number of polling places provided for than has been customary to have heretofore. In order to respond to this evident desire on the part of voters the committee was compelled to increase its number so that the additional polling places which will be provided for later would not be without a representative of the party. The action of the committee is highly commendable as it brings the choice of delegates and other party privileges more to the people. The following interviews show the favorable feeling:

Judge C. N. Post—I can certainly see no objection whatever to the action of the committee. F. B. Adams—It should have been done long ago. It was the proper thing to do and meets with general approval of all good Republicans.
