Now there is a prospect of another gas company entering the field. It is starting out on much the same principle as that of the new water company.

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FATAL FALL OF A YOUNG GIRL

Ellen Smith Picked Up Dying in a Back Yard.

No One Saw the Accident, but a Neighbor Heard the Fall.

Only a Month Ago the Mother Was Claimed by Death at San Rafael.
