The racing was not thoroughly interesting, as two "mistakes" were made by the stand, and no wonder those who have the interests of the trotters at heart quit in disgust.

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
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THE CLIPPER SHIP TACOMA TO BE ADDED TO THE TRANSPORT FLEET.

UNCLE SAM is after the fast American ship Tacoma, and the chances are that in a few days she will be added to the list of transports.

Vigorous complaint is being made by persons who find it necessary to drive their teams over the pavement.

SAN RAFAEL, July 2.—The championship of the eleventh annual tournament of the Pacific States Lawn Tennis Association lies between Samuel Hardy and "Alameda" Holmes.

The last of the semi-finals was played by Holmes and Bowen and Hardy and Weihe. Hardy easily disposed of his clever opponent in three straight sets, the score standing as follows: 6-0, 6-3, 6-2.

The game between Bowen and Bartlett was simply a walkover for Bowen. Bartlett put up a good game but was entirely outclassed, his opponent winning in straight sets, the score standing 6-4, 6-1, 6-0.

Paul Selby was matched against Summer Hardy in the semi-finals, but lost the match to the "crack" player from the City of Slumber by default.

Weihe won easily from Starke with a score of 6-2, 6-0, 6-2. Starke did his best, but three straight sets against him told plainly the tale of his opponent's superior skill.

The drawings for this tournament were singularly unfortunate, members of the California Club being matched against each other, all the same arrangement holding true for the Alameda and Oakland players.
