RUSSELL'S MASTERLY WORK


HOLDS HIS OPPONENTS DOWN TO TWO SAFE SHOTS.

boats. Adjacent thereto are in preparation the ribs and other sections of iron and steel out of which the monitor will be built. All five vessels will be under construction at the same time, while not far distant, as soon as the addition to the yard is complete, two ferry-boats will be put together. Work on these two latter vessels would have been commenced some time ago had there been room for them on the ways, but their construction had to be delayed because the United States Government urged the company to push the building of the men-of-war. With the building of these seven vessels there will be plenty of work at the Union Iron Works for at least one year. The finishing touches are being put on the Wisconsin by the addition of her armor plates, some of which measure eighteen inches in thickness. A short distance out in the bay from the yard lies the Iowa, on which a gang of men is at work making repairs on the boilers and other machinery.
