

NO ABATEMENT OF YELLOW FEVER AT HAMPTON HOME Disease Probably Brought by a Santiago Veteran—General Quarantine in Force.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The latest official advices received up to 8 o'clock to-night show a total of thirty-seven cases and seven deaths from yellow fever at the Soldiers' Home at Hampton, Va. One new case developed at the home to-day. Thus far the disease has been confined to the home, but all surrounding towns are excited and a vigorous quarantine is being maintained.

With the discovery of the probable origin of the infection and the two autopsies to-day, there can be no doubt, he says, that the disease being yellow fever, and continues: "There has been a very free intercommunication between the inmates and the people of Phoebus, a public house near the grounds having been freely visited until last night."

NEWPORT NEWS, July 31.—After a day of intense excitement over the yellow fever outbreak at the Soldiers' Home, Newport News to-night with a feeling of comparative security. It is felt now that no loophole has been left by which the scourge may find its way to this city.

STATE PENAL CODE A BOOK OF ERRORS Report of the Revision Commission.

SACRAMENTO, July 31.—The commission for the revision and reform of the law, consisting of A. Cammetti and R. N. Bulla, to-day submitted to Secretary of State Curry volume 3 of the report of the commission, the volume being the revised Penal Code of California. Says the commission's report in part:

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SAMPSON FILES SUIT FOR HIS PRIZE MONEY Libels the Maria Teresa and Other Spanish Vessels Taken by His Fleet.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Rear Admiral William T. Sampson has filed suit in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia against the Maria Teresa and other Spanish vessels captured by him and other Spanish vessels. In his bill he says that he brings the suit in his own behalf and also in behalf of all the officers and enlisted men of the United States navy who served with the United States naval force and took part in the capture of the Maria Teresa and other Spanish vessels.

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THROWN FROM A CARRIAGE Mother and Child Narrowly Escape Death at Santa Cruz.

SANTA CRUZ, July 31.—Mrs. George Tait and a serious accident yesterday afternoon, and her 2-year-old child, narrowly escape from being killed. Mrs. Tait was on her way to the depot, riding in a carriage. The horse got frightened at an electric car. Mrs. Tait jumped from the carriage and fell between the wheels, which ran over her, breaking an ankle. The baby was thrown under the horse, and William Hanley grabbed it just in time to save its life.
