

BOY OF THE THOMAS DAUGHERTY FOUND

Disappeared From His Home Last October.

GILROY, Sept. 14.—The body of Thomas L. Daugherty, who mysteriously disappeared from Gilroy last October, was found this morning by James Mossi and Keeler Keeler of this city.

The spot where the body was found is on a hillside, densely wooded and covered with underbrush.

Daugherty was a former City Marshal and Constable of Gilroy. He was more than 40 years of age, and in a state of temporary aberration wandered from his home.

Late to-night Mrs. Daugherty identified the pistol and scabbard found with the body as those of her husband.


THE BRITISH COMMERCIAL EXPEDITION IS SAFE
