RAILROAD DIRECTORS HONOR THE MEMORY OF CORNELIUS VANDERBILT

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—The directors of the nine Vanderbilt railroads met together yesterday at the Grand Central station and adopted appropriate resolutions on the death of Cornelius Vanderbilt.



The Vanderbilt Mausoleum. The structure that will receive the remains of Cornelius Vanderbilt and others of the family that follow him for a couple of generations to come stands near the little town of Newdorp, Staten Island.

It was begun in 1884, and was not quite completed at the time of the death of W. H. Vanderbilt, December 8, 1885. It was designed and erected by the celebrated architect, Richard M. Hunt, at a cost of \$200,000.

At the Vanderbilt mansion to-day many flowers were received from friends of the family. It is understood the floral decorations in St. Bartholomew Church, where the public funeral will be held at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning, will be very simple and they will be confined chiefly to the decoration of the Vanderbilt pew.
