

PANAMA, Sept. 15.—Bogota advices are to the effect that General Holguin has accepted the treasury portfolio. Merchants in the department of Antioquia have contracted a loan from the Colombian Government of \$20,000, with the privilege of issuing banking certificates.

Local banks there propose to effect similar financial operations. Lower exchange and improvement in business generally are expected to follow in consequence. Political matters are quiet.
