

CZAR AND KAISER FRIENDS ALL

Significance of Their Conference. GIVES ASSURANCE OF PEACE

TACIT UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE MONARCHS. All Germany Pleased Over the Terms of the Settlement of the Samoan Question With England.

BERLIN, Nov. 11.—The long expected agreement on the Samoan question and the visit of the Czar to Emperor William at Potsdam were two events which brought joy to the hearts of the Germans, for they were both construed as favorable to the empire and Government.

The correspondent of the Associated Press learns from a reliable American authority here that the bill as expected, passes with the clause amounting to the prohibition of the importation of American goods and manufactures into the United States will not be satisfied and will immediately retaliate with prohibitory measures of a similar nature.

The correspondent of the Associated Press learns that Prince Hohenzollern has been granted the right of annually granting the presents to the Emperor.

Since the Emperor's Hamburg speech all the leading stocks of the empire have had a big rise in the price of their stocks, some of them increasing 30 to 40 per cent.

The Vorwaerts claims that the creation of a huge naval port at Danzig is contemplated and that a new torpedo station near Flensburg has been planned. The same paper says that as long ago as 1891 the Emperor, while at the Kiel Naval Academy, formed the plan of making the German navy adequately offensive.

The Government press daily eulogizes the naval program. The setting of the subject was voted by General Posen, who proposed as the motto for the colonial policy, "A first-class army and a first-class navy." The Emperor is immensely pleased at the accumulating evidences of popular approval of his policy.

DRAINAGE CANAL CASE. Judge Kohlsaat Decides the Federal Court Has Jurisdiction.

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Judge C. C. Kohlsaat, in the United States Circuit Court to-day, rendered an important decision in the drainage canal case, holding that the Federal court has jurisdiction and refusing to remand the case. The Illinois and Michigan Canal Commission had brought a suit in the Circuit Court of Cook County, Illinois, to prevent the turning of the water of Lake Michigan into the sanitary district, by compelling the drainage canal to prevent the turning of the water of Lake Michigan into the sanitary district. The Illinois and Michigan Commission contended that the legal battle should be fought in the Circuit Court of Cook County, Illinois, and expected to be able to win. Judge Kohlsaat's decision is regarded as favorable to the sanitary district, and is expected to result in a speedy settlement of the points at issue. It is now believed that the canal will be opened on December 1.

DOING POLITICS IN SALT LAKE. Mrs. Foster Working Among Women. Special Dispatch to The Call. SALT LAKE, Nov. 11.—Mrs. J. Ellen Foster, president of the Women's Republican Association, is in the city for the purpose of learning the practical side of politics from this standpoint. In an interview she says: "I have been in the West for a month in the interest of Republicanism among women. I am, of course, greatly interested in these four States of Wyoming, Utah, Colorado and Idaho, where women not only think and feel, but where they can express their opinions at the ballot box. I know a number of women in these States and meet them in various gatherings in Washington and other parts of the country. But to see them at home is better yet. I have been several times before. "I am sorry for Utah that Mr. Roberts was elected to Congress. I do not believe he fairly represents the people of this commonwealth. It is bad for a State to seem to set itself against the law of the land and to defy the moral sense of the country. "I believe Utah did itself a great injustice in Mr. Roberts' election. Surely the Democratic party could have found a man who would stand for the State and Democratic principles and at the same time not be obnoxious to law-abiding citizens, Democrats and Republicans outside the State. "But it remains for the Congress of the United States to refuse to seat him, which, in my opinion, it will do. The Democrats of the nation will not sustain the Democrats of Utah. It is a great pity the issue was made."

TEN LIVES LOST WITH THE WILLIAM M. BIRD. Two Almost Famished Survivors Picked Up Off the North Carolina Coast. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 11.—News has been received here that the Philadelphia schooner William M. Bird, from Charleston, S. C., to New London, Conn., was wrecked in the October hurricane off the Frying Pan Shoals, North Carolina, and

ten of the crew, including Captain Barrett, perished. Two survivors, George W. Loud, the mate, and George Robinson, seaman, have been landed at Salisbury, Md., by the schooner Samuel T. Beacham from Jacksonville, Fla., which vessel rescued them on the afternoon of November 3, twenty-nine miles southwest of the Frying Pan Lightship. The survivors had been without food or water for ninety hours and suffered great hardships, having chewed the leather of their shoes to keep from starving. They have not recovered sufficiently to tell just how their comrades perished, but they state in an incoherent manner that the lost men were swept off one by one from the wreck, as their strength grew weaker and were drowned. CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 11.—The schooner William Bird, which was wrecked near Frying Pan Shoals, on October 30, only two of the crew surviving, was of seventy-three tons burden and cleared from this port October 29, with lumber. She was built at Camden, N. J.
