

RIOT RAISED AMONG CHINESE QUARANTINE CASES. The Spirit of Unrest in the Celestial Quarter Was Aroused at the Sight of Coffins.



Police Driving Away the Mischief Makers.

The police were unusually severe, but the quarantined rioting, under the strained conditions that exist in Chinatown just now, cannot be permitted and the police have decided to spare no one who is caught making trouble.

Chinese riot at the sight of coffins. Board of Health decides to raise the quarantine in twenty days from the last case. Six companies' physicians may make autopsies.

The spirit of unrest that has been growing in Chinatown broke out in an incident last evening, and it was not until policemen charged the crowds with clubs that the unruly Mongolians were content to remain quiet.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board of Health that the plague quarantine at present in force in that section of the city and county should be extended to the twenty-fifth day from the date of the last case.

It was introduced very gingerly and only after a report by Dr. Chalmers, the chief sanitarian, had been called for.

"I think we might have a report from Dr. Chalmers, the chief sanitarian, and Dr. Williamson, apropos of nothing and forgetting the fact that a report of Dr. Chalmers' had just been read.

"Yes, let us have a report," seconded several of the physicians, and Dr. Chalmers rose and said that a clean, dune Chinatown was getting to be.

"It is improving from day to day," suggested Dr. Chalmers.

"It will be done in four days," replied Dr. Chalmers.

"No, there are no suspicious cases," put in Dr. Sullivan.

"No, there are none," answered Dr. Chalmers, and then Dr. Buckley, the foundation having been laid, offered his resolution, saying, "Then in pursuance of Dr. Chalmers' report I offer the following resolution: That the quarantine be extended to the twenty-fifth day from the date of the last case."

It received somewhat of a vote yesterday, but one of its collateral issues, there is a temporary restraining order that prevents the Board of Health from keeping the physicians of the Six Companies outside the lines, and on motion of the attorney, the order was immediately sent to the Board of Health.

Otherwise the powers will act for themselves. The Foreign Minister also said that riots of the same nature had occurred on the frontier of Tonquin, and far from subsidizing the agitation had redoubled and the French Consul had been compelled to leave his post.

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LUNA'S FACE WILL BE PARTLY HIDDEN. An Eclipse of the Moon Scheduled for This Evening.

A PARTIAL eclipse of the moon, visible generally throughout North and South America, Europe and Africa, takes place to-night, which, if weather conditions are favorable, may be seen in all parts of California.

The phenomenon is of little importance from an astronomical point of view, but of general interest from the fact that it occurs in the early part of the evening, when so many people may see it without inconvenience. Only about one one-hundredth of the diameter of the moon will be totally obscured, but the darkened space will be much more extended.

The moon will enter the penumbra at 7:15 p. m. and the shadow at 9:24, and leave the penumbra at 11:41 p. m.
