

MRS. GLADSTONE'S PERIOD OF SUFFERING IS ENDED

Widow of England's "Grand Old Man" Unconscious for Seventy-Two Hours Before Death's Hand Is Laid Upon Her.

LONDON, June 14.—Mrs. Gladstone, widow of William E. Gladstone, died at 5:40 p. m. to-day. She had been unconscious for about seventy-two hours, and died without regaining consciousness.

The news was immediately conveyed to the Queen, the Prince of Wales, the dean of Westminster, the dean of Lincoln, Sir William Vernon Harcourt, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, Arthur J. Balfour and others.

In the course of the evening William Gladstone, heir to Hawarden, arrived from Eton, shortly followed by two sisters from London. The bells of Hawarden Church rang muffled peals.

By courtesy of the dean of Westminster and in accordance with arrangements made in 1898, the funeral will be held in the abbey. The interment probably will take place on June 19, being of as private a character as possible.

Mrs. Gladstone was Lady Catherine Glyne, daughter and heiress of Sir Stephen Glyne, who died when she was yet a mere child.

In 1859 she married the rising young statesman, William E. Gladstone, on the same day that her sister married Lord Lytton, father of General the Hon. N. G. Lytton, now commanding a division of General Buller's army in Natal.

She died at her home at Hawarden, in the county of Lincoln, at the age of 82. She was a devoted Christian, and her life was a model of domestic virtue.

She was a member of La Estrella Parlor of San Francisco, where she was elected president of the Native Daughters of the Golden West.

At the evening session nominations for grand officers were made, and many of the ladies showed ability in speaking of the past and the future of the order.

The proposition to establish a scholarship in the name of the late Mrs. Gladstone was adopted, and the balance of the forenoon was devoted to a revision of the Grand Parlor laws.
