

CEASELESS SLAUGHTER OF TAGALS

Weekly Record of the Losses of Insurgents and Americans.

EVIDENCE THAT WAR IS NOT AT AN END

Two Hundred Filipinos Slain, While of the United States Troops Twelve Were Killed and Eleven Wounded.

MANILA, July 22.—It is officially reported that last week 200 insurgents were killed and 120 surrendered or were captured.

This includes the casualties of Colonel William E. Berkhimer's engagement with a force of the Twenty-eighth Volunteer Infantry, who attacked 200 insurgents entrenched two miles east of Taal, killing twenty-eight.

A detachment of the Signal Corps while repairing wires was twice ambushed. Captain Charles D. Roberts of the Thirty-fifth Volunteer Infantry, who was captured by the Filipinos last May, has been released here on parole. He will not return to captivity.

Senator Buchanan last Thursday sent to Aguinaldo, by means of Aguinaldo's mother, the amnesty resolutions adopted by the meeting of representative Filipinos on June 21, together with General MacArthur's answer to them and other documents bearing upon the restoration of peace.

ASSERT THAT DEWEY PROMISED INDEPENDENCE

SIQUE FALLS, S. D., July 22.—A letter has been received by Senator F. Admiral Dewey—i place at your disposal the ships in my fleet for the conveyance of both the Filipino leaders and the arms you may get. Moreover, I think my Government is willing to supply you with arms.

CARGO OF GOLD BROUGHT DOWN BY THE AMOR

Dust and Drafts Aboard Her Are Valued at Two Millions.

Carries Ninety Passengers, Many of Whom Have Made Handsome Fortunes in the Klondike.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 22.—The steamer Amor, the richest treasure ship of the season, bringing a million in gold dust and ninety passengers, most of whom have made fortunes in the Klondike either mining or trading, reached here this afternoon.

There is said to be a gold mine here of course many drafts representing another million in dust which the passengers had disposed of before leaving Dawson.

Among the richest men on board were Robert Anderson, who located the Government concession on Hunker Creek in which a number of Vancouverites are interested and out of a pocket in which \$90,000 was taken; Hart, the owner of Discovery of Bonanza, Cass, Neill, who has made \$100,000 out of the Yukon Hotel, Dawson, and who is on her way to Sweden; H. McLoughlin, a Bonanza claim owner; C. Lepland, who owns discovery of Last Chance; Turner Townsend, who has just disposed of a ton of tobacco and cigars in Dawson, and Mrs. Shute, wife of the senior partner in Shute & Mills, who took \$400,000 out of four claims on Gold Run, and the Cassidy Brothers, who just sold one claim on French Hill for an immense sum.

Business men estimate the year's output of Klondike at twenty-five millions, taking into account the fact that the claims are now being worked summer and winter. There is still a large amount of gold being mined, and it is impossible to work some of the richest claims at a profit.
