

TICKETS PUT FORTH BY THE REGULAR REPUBLICAN CLUBS TO CONFOUND KELLY AND CRIMMINS AT THE PRIMARY

Former Kickers Recognize the Authority of the Regular Party Organization.

YESTERDAY was a busy day at the headquarters of the Republican County Committee in the Baldwin annex. The henchmen of Kelly and Crimmins who caused such an uproar at Shields Hall night before last recognized early yesterday morning that the anti-boss forces were in possession of the works and could not be dislodged. The kickers, after advising with their leaders, decided to file their tickets and comply with the provisions of the call for the primary election, as officially published in this journal.

Resort to New Tactics.

Kelly and Crimmins have now resorted to other tactics to disrupt the Republican party. Last night they put through the plan to nominate candidates for the legislature by the county Congressmen at the District Convention. They will have an old style Kelly and Crimmins primary next Saturday. They expect to have their stuff the ballot boxes at their pleasure, as they will have all the election officers inside and no opposition outside. There is no candidate in the Republican party opposing the nomination of Julius Kahn for Congress. The separate convention and separate primaries were called to perpetuate Kelly and Crimmins control of the Congressional Committee.

The Republicans of the Forty-third Assembly District, who will vote at the polling place, 262 Mason street, to-morrow, should be on their guard against the perpetration of fraud. The polling place for time of the precincts has been established at that quarter. The district bosses are already preparing for fraudulent work.

Members of the Forty-first Assembly District who despise bossism and have no use for the creatures of a boss should not make the mistake of voting for Kelly and Crimmins. They are a walk-over in the fight against Dibble. He is a tricky and cunning politician, full of expedients and devices to catch a few votes he would not hesitate to place the sign anti-boss and anti-Dibble on the door of the district. He has already resorted to the trick of placing the names of well-known Republican citizens on the list of delegates. He has also the names so enrolled is that of Judge Van Fleet, member of the Republican National Committee, and the name of Van Fleet, chairman of the Republican State Committee. It is also on the Dibble ticket for the election of the district. He has an unwary citizen, hastily scanning the names, might fancy that the ticket represented the Republican organization. Further scrutiny, however, will disclose the fact that Dibble delegates to the local convention follow the same purpose is to use the name of Van Fleet and other well-known citizens on the State list to pull through his own crowd for the legislative and judicial convention.

Not Important.

The election of delegates to the Santa Cruz convention is not of vital importance. There is nothing for the convention to do but to place in the field nine Presidential electors, but the bosses are very anxious indeed to pull through a leadership which will renominate Dibble for the Assembly.

It is hardly necessary to remind the residents of the Forty-first district that they were never represented in the legislature when Dibble was there. He was the agent of bossism. He did not consult the people of the district. He was the Herrin for orders. He was the bell weather of the corrupt band, and all the bosses followed the district committee from the interior wondered how it happened that the Forty-first district elected Dibble to the legislature. It happened because the prosperous and saving Republicans of the district paid no attention to the nomination, but the contrary, stayed at home while Langdon, Rainey, Kelly and Crimmins drummed up the push to elect delegates. It will happen again if the clean and decent Republicans are not on the alert. The bosses are already planning for crooked work in that district at the primary election to-morrow.Steps should be taken to place a genuine anti-boss and anti-Dibble ticket in the hands of every voter of the district. The tickets should be so placed to-day or to-night in order to elude devices and tricks to-morrow.Tickets Are Filed. 
of Solano County, was appointed to escort Mr. Metcalfe to the platform.

DEMOCRATIC CLUB SPLITS.

Voters of the Thirty-Fifth Resent Action of Phelan Managers.

Thomas E. Curran, one of Phelan's followers, and Stephen Byrne, who has the voters of the district behind him, wish to go to the State Senate from the Nineteenth District. At the meeting last night of the Bryan and Stevenson Club of the Thirty-fifth Assembly District, Chairman E. J. Bell and his followers, who represent the better element of the Democratic party, then opened the meeting by placing Captain W. May in the chair. Three rousing cheers for the success of the Democratic ticket, in so far as Bryan and Stevenson are concerned, were given with a will. Mr. Phelan and his City Hall following were not included.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Comptroller Tracewell of the Treasury has rendered a decision in which he holds that the Hawaiian Islands, under the act of May 18, 1900, constitute an integral part of the United States, and therefore officers of the navy therein are serving within the realm or dominion of the United States, and consequently are not "beyond seas" within section 13 of the navy personnel act.
