

MARK OPPOSES LOCAL PHYSICAL INSTRUCTORS

Will Import a Number of Athletic Experts From the East

Informing Mayor Phelan That the Board Hopes to Place This Branch on a Scientific Basis.

Chairman Mark of the Board of Education announced yesterday that it had been decided not to reinstate Professors Stahl, Mehlhorn and Barth, who were recently removed from their positions as special teachers of physical culture.

Mark was delegated to a committee of one to investigate the petitions, and after conferring with what he calls the influential German citizens he came to the conclusion that while he was in favor of the restoration of physical culture the branch would be undertaken by some Eastern expert who would be imported for the purpose.

A number of Germans whom I interviewed on the subject, said Mark, "expressed themselves in favor of physical culture, but none insisted on the reinstatement of Stahl, Mehlhorn and Barth."

The petitions filed by the German societies do not insist on the reinstatement of the deposed teachers, but only that physical culture be taken up again on broad lines.

The three men who were employed did not agree among themselves as to the best method of teaching physical culture.

Mayor Phelan has evidently taken the board to task for its abolition of physical culture in the schools.

Mark informs the Mayor that the board is in sympathy with the teaching of physical culture, but believes the way it has been taught has not the approval of those directly interested in the branch.
