TROOPS GO TO BE MOVED FROM CHINA

Will Be Quartered in Some Pleasant Portion of the Philippines Whence They Can Again Be Placed in the Field at a Few Days' Notice, if Necessary.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The developments of the day in the Chinese situation still point to a speedy withdrawal of the United States troops from China. General Chaffee has added the weight of his opinion to that already entertained by many officials here. It is probably significant that the general's statement on this point was given publicly by the administration. No confirmation is at hand here of the report that Great Britain and Germany have joined in an agreement to remain together in Peking regardless of the attitude of the other powers. Should this be true the doubtless would hasten the rearward movement of the American troops, for there is a determination to avoid becoming involved in any clash with the powers which might reasonably be expected to follow the execution of this reported British-German programme. If there have been any further responses to the Russian note relative to the evacuation, their purport cannot be ascertained. This delay no longer interferes with the execution of the American policy. The State Department has a reasonably accurate understanding of the attitude of even those powers that have not made formal responses to the Russian note so that the mere written record of their views is not of importance. The part of the problem relative to withdrawal that remains unsolved is the best means of securing guarantees for the attainment of the few objects set out in Secretary Hay's note of July 3, which have not yet been secured.

Possibly guarantees must be obtained from two sides—from the Chinese Government as to the security of American treaty rights, and the creation of a claims commission, which shall provide for the payment of indemnity for the losses suffered by American citizens and for the expenditures on account of the Peking relief expedition. Then it may be possible that it may be regarded as necessary, if any of the allies refuse to leave Peking as it persists in the United States in the matter of trade, of the "open door" and of all rights now guaranteed to us in China by treaty, be made a matter of special agreement between the United States and the Chinese Government. It is now that because the United States troops are to be withdrawn this autumn from China, our interests will be left completely at the mercy of the Chinese Government. On the contrary such disposition will be made of the troops that they, with the Chinese, can be returned to China in order, if necessary. To this end the entire army of General Chaffee will be quartered in some of the pleasant portions of the Philippines. If they are wanted again in China they can be transported inside of a week, thoroughly refreshed and fitted for effective action.

Minister Wu has not yet been clothed with powers by his Government to effect a settlement of the Chinese trouble directly with the Washington authorities. The officials are inclined to believe that such large power as this will be conferred upon him, although he may, as the Chinese Minister in Europe, play an important part in the preliminary to the institution of regular negotiations through commissioners for a final settlement.

MISSIONARIES WHO WERE KILLED BY BOXERS

SHANGHAI, Sept. 8.—John Goodnow, the United States Consul General here, after inquiries in every possible source, learns that the number of British and American missionaries murdered during the uprising in China has been ninety-three, while 179 others stationed in Chili and Shansi provinces are unaccounted for, and there is reason for the belief that such large power as this will be conferred upon him, although he may, as the Chinese Minister in Europe, play an important part in the preliminary to the institution of regular negotiations through commissioners for a final settlement.

FOOD IS SAID TO BE SCARCE IN PEKING

LONDON, Sept. 11.—Lord Salisbury will return to London Friday when some fresh developments in the Chinese situation are expected. Beyond Japan's reply showing her intention to continue to occupy Peking there is little to throw further light. From Shanghai comes a report that Li Hung Chang has dispatched an urgent telegram to the British minister at Tai-yuen-fu announcing the purpose of the allies to advance to Peking and perhaps even further. The Tientsin correspondent of the Daily News asserts that everybody in Peking is living on "bully" beef and hard tack.

WERE MASSACRED AT PAOTING-FU

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Some days ago Robert E. Spear, one of the secretaries of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, called to Shanghai asking details in connection with the massacre at Paoting-fu. The reply came to-day from the "Wall Street Journal" that the included in the message are G. Yardley Taylor, M.D.; Rev. F. E. Simcox, wife and three children, and Courland Van Renzler Hodges, M. D., and wife.

AUTHORIZED TO OPEN PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

LONDON, Sept. 10.—The Chinese Minister in London, Sir Chen Loh Fen Loh, it is understood, has received credentials authorizing the opening of peace negotiations. It is intimated that similar powers have been conferred on the Chinese Ministers at other capitals, and that their credentials are such as will satisfy the American and European Governments.

WHEELER RETIRES FROM ACTIVE DUTY

General Wade Will Take Temporary Charge of the Department of the Lakes. CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—General Joseph Wheeler, U. S. A., retired to private life to-day, having reached the age limit of 64 years. General Wade will be temporarily in charge of the Department of the Lakes until General Otis arrives. General Wheeler will go to his home in Alabama, and he and his daughter will take a trip abroad.

LYNCH LAW FOR AN ALABAMA NEGRO

Taken From the Prison at Wetumpka and Hanged Without the Formality of a Trial. MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 10.—Zeke Floyd, a negro, was taken from jail at Wetumpka late last night and hanged. Floyd had entered the sleeping room of two young women and when discovered jumped from the window.

MARINE BATTALION TO REPUBLICANS

Campaign Fought Almost Entirely on National Issues.

In Cumberland County There Was an Interesting Contest Regarding the Enforcement of the Liquor Law.

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 10.—Carrying out its traditions of many years with but one break, Maine went Republican in the State election to-day by a good old-time majority. The Republican State ticket was elected with all but four Congressmen and a great majority of the Legislature. There was every incentive to the vote for the party that had been a spirited one. The vote was not quite as heavy as in 1896, but exceeded that of the 1898 election by thousands. The Democrats gained much satisfaction from the earlier returns, showing a gain in the Congressmen from 18 to 20 per cent. This increase over the 1898 vote did not apply to any particular county, but it was general throughout the State. The Republicans, however, had rather discounted the fall-off in the vote for the Maine district ticket from that in 1896, and the managers were not at all surprised at an apparent loss of 12 per cent. Their entire ticket, headed by J. P. Hill for Governor, was elected, and were all four of the Congressmen—Allen in Reed's old district, Littlefield in Dingley's old district, Burchell in the Third and Fourth, and the other in the Fifth.

LI AUTHORIZED TO NEGOTIATE FOR PEACE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The Chinese Minister, Mr. Wu, to-day delivered to the State Department a copy of the imperial edict conferring on Li Hung Chang absolute and unconditional authority to negotiate with the powers for peace and for the settlement of questions growing out of the war. The edict is dated on the last day of the seventh month, Chinese calendar, which is about August 24. It is issued by the Emperor and not the Empress Dowager, indicating that the former is now exercising those imperial functions which some of the powers, notably Great Britain, have insisted belonged to him. The document does not mention the Empress Dowager, but it was transmitted through Peking-fu, and probably emanated from the imperial household which has been at that point for some time.

ROOSEVELT SPEAKS ON NATIONAL ISSUES

LA CROSSE, Wis., Sept. 10.—The special train bearing Governor Roosevelt and his party left for Fargo and the West at 11 o'clock to-night. There were two meetings to-day, one beginning at 2 o'clock for those outside the city and one at 8 o'clock for the inhabitants of La Crosse and immediate vicinity. The meetings were held in the rink, an immense hall, which was crowded. The numbers outside exceeded many times those able to get in.

HEAVY ODDS ON THE RESULT OF THE ELECTION

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Another political bet of \$10,000 to \$4,000 that McKinley will be elected was reported to the Republican National Committee to-day. J. S. Sawyer, who represents Colorado in the Republican National Committee, says he would like to place other bets on McKinley at the same odds, but that thus far he had found no opportunity to do so in New York. The men with Bryan expect the odds against the Nebraska candidate will be increased.

BULLER CAPTURES A BOER POSITION

BRITISH LOSE THIRTEEN MEN KILLED AND TWENTY-FIVE WOUNDED AT SPITZKOP. LONDON, Sept. 10.—The War Office has received a report from Lord Roberts saying that the British, on September 7, attacked and captured the Boer position at Spitzkop. He adds that the Boers retreated over a narrow causeway, suffering heavily. The British had thirteen men killed and twenty-five wounded.

FRAUD CHARGED AT THE POPULIST CONVENTION

DENVER, Sept. 10.—Three State convention men here, the Nebraska Bryan Club Republican and Populist, in effect will be made to effect a fusion. This is understood to be favored with practical unanimity by the delegates to the Silver Republican and Populist conventions. Among the Democrats, however, there is a division on the subject. A State ticket is to be chosen, but the greatest interest is felt in the effect the result of these conventions will have on the fusion.

HANNA WILL DO BUT LITTLE SPEECHMAKING

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Senator M. A. Hanna arrived in Chicago to-day to take charge of the Republican national campaign. He was hurried to the city by Chairman Payne of the National Committee at national headquarters preparing the programme for the next three days. "There is nothing to say concerning the campaign, except that things are looking right every day," was the Senator's confident assertion to his callers.

BRYAN ADDRESSES THE NEBRASKA CLUB

MCGOY'S WIFE SAYS FIGHT WAS A FAKE

Like Mrs. Corbett She Files Suit for Divorce and Gives Some Information Regarding Recent Bout at Madison Square in a Sensational Affidavit.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—After revelations in her answer to her husband's complaint in affidavits by wives of the two pugilists, corroborated by others concerned in the deal, no one can well refuse to believe that a gigantic swindle was perpetrated on the public by Corbett and McCoy. What purported to be a prize fight, it seems, was nothing more than a carefully rehearsed imitation. More than \$7,000 was taken at the gates and a much larger sum was realized as result of the wagers made in a manner that amounted to sheer robbery. The facts, which have been more than surmised since the fight, are set forth in affidavits made by the wives of the two pugilists, each of whom has brought suit against her husband for divorce. When McCoy, referring to Mrs. Corbett, when "Hell hath no fury like a woman scorned," he might also have had his own wife in mind. McCoy last week served papers on his wife for divorce. Now he is in hiding, and said in concluding his affidavit. The charges made against him are of a sensational nature. Divorce is demanded on statutory grounds. Mrs. Selby concludes her petition with the declaration that her husband bargained to forfeit the fight with Corbett for a price and that he posted \$10,000 to guarantee that he would keep faith with his co-conspirators. "Eddie" Burke, one of the best known pugilists, is named as the man who held the forfeits posted by the two pugilists. Mr. McCoy brought his marital troubles to a climax by beginning action for divorce, his brother serving the papers on his wife last Friday. McCoy named James Kinnebrew and George Kearney as co-respondents, charging his wife with improper conduct with them. Mrs. Selby's response was prompt. She consulted Mr. Hummel, the result being an order for arrest obtained from Judge Scott, who named the ball as \$500. McCoy's arrest was planned for to-night, it being the intention to serve the warrant on the morning of the 11th. McCoy's friends, however, heard of the contemplated arrest and gave the pugilist warning.

It is believed he was murdered by being struck with a coupling pin. The tracks of two huggies were found leading from the spot where the body lay, about seventy feet from the railroad track. In the pockets of the man's clothing were billheads of D. J. Mahoney & Son, San Francisco, and letters to the same name. The coroner believes the deceased is J. H. Mahoney. The dead man is about 30 years of age.

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
