TIGHTLY grasping the hand of a kindhearted Deputy Sheriff, with his eyes turned longingly on the bag of sweets held in the other hand of the official and accepting the kisses of the aunt who for the past four years has attended to his every want, without the least sign of affection, little Montee Ledderhos yesterday bade farewell to San Francisco and started for the insane asylum at Napa, condemned by the verdict of the doctors to imprisonment for life.

A fond mother, whose every heartbeat is for her little boy despite his terrible affliction, bent at death's door, worn out with watching and constant attendance on the unfortunate maniac.


Drs. Lustig and Rethers appeared before Judge Lawlor yesterday morning and informed him that in their opinion the child was hopelessly insane.
