Archbishop Admonishes Parents in Sermon at St. Patrick's.

His Grace Administers the Sacrament of Confirmation to a Large Class During the Afternoon.

The holy sacrament of confirmation was administered yesterday afternoon at St. Patrick's Church by His Grace Archbishop Riordan to a class of over three hundred boys and girls. The ceremony was one of the most impressive of the kind ever held in this city.

The service commenced at 4 o'clock, but longed before the hour the sacred edifice was crowded to the doors by friends of the children, who devoutly remained till the close of the confirmation. At the opening processional the Archbishop entered the sanctuary. Immediately investing himself with a white cope and miter and receiving his crozier from the hands of Rev. Father Mulligan he descended the steps from the high altar and waited for the children to kneel before him.

"My dear people and children, this is a day that should ever be carried in your memories. It is a day when you received a most solemn sacrament and that you are now enlisted as soldiers of God. To the parents especially would I address a few words. Are you aware of the great responsibility that is on your shoulders? You must realize that you are the parents of the children who are now being confirmed. Christ said those beautiful words, 'Suffer little children to come unto me, for such is the kingdom of God.' The responsibility rests with you. These little ones belong to God and it would be a terrible thing for you to neglect them in the proper manner.
