EMPEROR KWANG SU IS ABOUT TO RETURN TO PEKING

General Richardson Burns the Villages Where Missionaries Robinson and Norman Were Murdered.

ROME, Nov. 7.—The Peking correspondent of the Tribune writes November 3, says: "News from a private source, coming direct from the province of Shensi, where the Chinese court took refuge, says that Emperor Kwang Su is about to return to Peking via Honan."

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The following dispatch from Major General Lorne Campbell has been received by the Secretary of State for India: "At Tingling the Chinese attempted to steal the boxes and caused an explosion. Two soldiers and three camp followers were injured. A large number of Chinese were killed or wounded, owing to their wadded coats catching fire."

General Richardson burned two villages, the places where Messrs. Robinson and Norman, the missionaries, were murdered, and demanded that the city of Yangchow should pay \$5000 as compensation to the families of the victims. The payment was guaranteed.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 7.—It is reported that the Empress Dowager has ordered the province of Honan, has ordered the southern armies to march promptly to guard the passes on the frontiers.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Minister Wu called at the State Department to-day and talked with Secretary Hay for half an hour about the proceedings of the foreign ministers at Peking. The department takes the ground that while the Chinese themselves are trying to get together on common ground to present a

united front to the Chinese in the negotiations it would be highly impolitic to make public any little dissensions or differences. It is also reported that an American cruiser is to be sent to enforce the divorce.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—A Journal's special from Vienna says: King Alexander of Serbia has announced his intention of divorcing Queen Draga, whom he married three months ago. He is tired of his wife and seeks the freedom of his bachelor days. Draga is prostrated.

Dividend Declared. NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The Directors of the Standard Oil Company have declared a dividend of 10 per cent payable to stockholders of record November 15. This makes 48 per cent in dividends paid out by the Standard Oil Company this year.

Foreigners Must Register. GIBRALTAR, Nov. 7.—An order in council empowering the Governor to expel any person from Gibraltar whom the Governor may deem to be a danger to the public safety, British and other residents not employed in her Majesty's service are required to register at the police offices and must take out permits.

Urges Payment of Claims. TANGIERS, Nov. 7.—United States Consul General Gunnerus has urged the Government officials, urging the immediate payment of the American claims. It is also reported that an American cruiser is to be sent to enforce the divorce.

Divorce for Marchioness of Anglesey. LONDON, Nov. 7.—The Marchioness of Anglesey has been granted a divorce from her husband, who is head of the Patent family. The case was heard in camera.

INCREASED MAJORITY IN CONGRESS BOTH HOUSES IN FAVOR OF THE CONTINUED REPUBLICAN COMPLEXION OF THE NATIONAL LEGISLATURE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Information received up to 3 o'clock this morning indicates increased majorities for the Republicans in both houses of Congress. There is no uncertainty regarding the continued Republican complexion of the Senate. In the House the Republican forces are credited with a victory which will return William A. Clark and one other Democrat. To offset this are the Republican success in Delaware, Illinois, Kansas, New Jersey, South Dakota, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

Nothing short of a veritable Democratic landslide can deprive the Republicans of the control of the Senate before March 3, 1901, and unless there is an almost unprecedented political upheaval before that date they are assured of control for at least two years longer. Returns from several of the close States are still undecided, and in some instances the official count may have to be awaited to determine whether the Republicans or the opposition will control the Legislatures which will elect United States Senators.

The Republican majority over all opposition in the next Senate will not be less than that enjoyed by the Republicans have carried all the new State Legislatures to which they now make claim it may be high. The following are the results of the elections in the States:
