

ZAMBAT OBJECTS POPE'S LEADER

Arouses Hot Discussion in French Chamber of Deputies.

Ribot Defends His Holiness, Who He Said Is Entitled to Raise His Voice in Defense of Religious Interests.

PARIS, Jan. 14.—In the Chamber of Deputies to-day the Government was interpellated by Marcel Zambat, Radical Socialist, on the "interference of the Pope in the domestic affairs of France," as shown in the recent letter of the Pope to Cardinal Richier, the Archbishop of Paris, dealing with the proposed bill of the Premier, M. Waldeck-Rousseau, known as the law of associations, and aiming at the suppression of religious communities, in which the Pontiff defended the religious orders. M. Zambat asked the Government to protest against this letter.

Seven Years for Manslaughter.



FAVORS CHANGES IN MAIL RATES

Postal Commission Files Report After Long Investigation.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The Postal Commission of the House and Senate, which has been investigating postal matters for the last two years, made its report to-day. The commission reports in favor of excluding from the second class mail rate first, books, whether bound or unbound; second, newspapers and periodicals unsealed sent by a news agent to another news agent or returned to the publisher; third, sample copies of newspapers above a certain small fixed proportion of the circulation.
