WHITES PAY LITTLE ATTENTION TO THE THREATS OF THE INDIANS. Tom Tiger, Captain of Insurgent Snake Band, and His Father, Walka Tiger, Are Held by United States Marshal.

OMAHA, Jan. 26.—Lieutenant Dixon, in command of Troop A, Eighth Cavalry, was sent to the Indian Territory to quell the Creek Indian disturbances, made a second report to headquarters to-day.

There are 600 insurgent Snakes four miles south of the city, at the old Indian camping grounds. Fickets are patrolling the town limits, as it is feared an attempt will be made before morning to release the Indian captain.

SOUTH MALESTER, I. T., Jan. 26.—There were no new developments among the Choctaw Indians to-day. Governor Dukes says he cannot maintain order without the help of the Federal Government. It is not believed the Indians made threats credited to them. They say they will not destroy or injure railway property.

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INFURIATED FRENCHMAN ATTEMPTS TO MURDER HIS FORMER WIFE. Demas Massonabe Sends Three Bullets Into Woman's Body and Shoots Her Young Son Who Comes to Her Assistance.

Says the Entire Region East of the Andes Is More Productive Than the Transvaal or the Klondike.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Sir Martin Conway, an explorer who has contributed much to what is known of the mountain regions of the world, returned from his third trip of exploration to South America.

Sir Martin, whose explorations have extended over a period of ten years, who has devoted nearly thirty years to scientific research, said last night that his work in South America would mark the close of his career as an explorer.

"The eastern slope of the Andes," Sir Martin said, "affords a field for scientific research which is almost unlimited. Practically nothing is known about the botany and nothing about the mineral resources of the vast region lying between the Andes and the Amazon."

"I have been interested in the subject from a scientific standpoint. It is immensely rich in minerals—how rich no one knows."

"Do you believe that American or English capitalists will soon look to that region as a promising field for investment?"

"Probably not at present," Sir Martin replied. "Capitalists are cautious and the mineral resources of the region are as yet an undetermined quantity. There are some indications, however, that the territory to the east of the Andes is rich in minerals. Gold, silver, copper, tin and other metals are there in vast quantities. It is in the future more productive of precious metals than either the Transvaal or the Klondike."

MINERS WILL ASK A GENERAL ADVANCE. Outline of Demands to Be Made at Joint Conference With Operators.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 26.—The demands to be made by the delegates to the national convention of the United Mine Workers of America, at the joint conference with the operators to be held in Columbus, Ohio, on Thursday of next week, were outlined at an executive session of the miners' convention to-day.

These demands will include first, an absolute strike against all operators on a basis to cover the entire competitive field, composed of Indiana, Illinois and the different districts of Indiana. This will mean, if the operators accede to the proposition to be presented to them, a right of the miners to a 10 per cent. advance in the district of Indiana. A scale of prices for fuel and inside day labor will be fixed at the joint conference and will obtain in the district of Indiana. An advance of 10 to 15 per cent. is believed, will be asked.

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THE WOULD-BE MURDERER, HIS INTENDED VICTIM AND THE 14-YEAR-OLD BOY WHOSE LUCKY FIGHT PROBABLY SAVED HIS MOTHER FROM BEING KILLED.

ENRAGED by the refusal of his divorced wife to sign a deed transferring a piece of property at the corner of Cortland and Buena Vista avenues, Demas Massonabe attempted to murder her.

Massonabe attempted to murder her at her little notion and tobacco store at 406 Sixth street, near Harrison, yesterday morning. Massonabe is now in jail, charged with assault to commit murder, and his former wife is at her home suffering from wounds, none of them, however, considered fatal.

Massonabe went to his former wife's store about 10 o'clock and, producing a paper, said that Attorney Bergerot desired her to sign it. At the time of the purchase of the property the land was mortgaged, but is about to be sold. Massonabe claims that there is a balance of \$50 coming, and told his former wife that she could have this amount if she would only sign the paper. She said that there was some fraud in the transaction and would under no circumstances affix her signature.

Her eldest daughter by a former marriage, Elizabeth Courages, and her son, Joseph Courages, 14 years old, were in the store at the time.

When Mrs. Massonabe refused to sign the document her husband became furious. He whipped her with his pistol and fired at his former wife, the bullet striking her in the arm. The woman ran toward the door, got into the kitchen and locked the door. Massonabe tried to force the door, but was unable to do so.

Young Courages, luckily, ran to his mother's rescue and tackled his stepfather. Massonabe shook the boy off and, firing a shot at him, rushed to the rear of the house. He then loaded his revolver, and then smashing in a window gained entrance to the room where the frightened woman was hiding in a corner. Two shots found a lodging place in her body and others went wild, eight bullets being fired by the murderous Frenchman.

Young Courages, who had followed his stepfather, again attacked him vigorously. Elizabeth Courages and her son, Joseph Courages, 14 years old, were in the store at the time.
