


MEETING OFF THE STORMY HORN PERHAPS THEIR LAST ON EARTH

ST. LOUIS, April 2.—Mrs. Carrie Nation of Kansas spent another hour and a half in St. Louis to-day and left in disgust at the things she saw and the treatment she received.

She arrived from Indianapolis over the Big Four this morning and left later for Kansas City over the Wabash. She said she was going home to attend to the cases that are pending there against her.

She told him she would pay for him that he might lead a better life. "But you're ruining other families," replied Mrs. Nation, shaking her fists in Sauerburger's face.

Some women in the throng about Mrs. Nation yelled: "Yes, you're ruining hundreds of families."

The crowd cheered and Sauerburger became more excited than ever. He grabbed a seltzer bottle and shook it in Mrs. Nation's face. She did not move. He drew his revolver and told her to leave or he would shoot her and somebody else, too.

She made her way to the street and made a speech to the crowd there. "This is the kind of a city you've got. Oh, I must come back and clean these places out. I can smash if I can't do anything else. The women of this city will help me."
