RELIEF PROMISED BY NEW TAX BILL

Assessor Dodge Says Much Is Gained by the Amendments.

The Settlement of Many Questions of Long Standing and of Annoyance to Public Made Possible.

The bill amending the revenue laws, introduced into the Legislature early in the last session and finally passed in a much altered form, has just been received at the Assessor's office.

Assessor Dodge, in speaking of the radical changes which the bill will effect in the affairs of his office, states that the most important innovation concerns the collection by seizure and sale, of taxes on personal property not secured by real estate.

Another amendment makes it the duty of each person to file a sworn statement with the Assessor as to whether or not he is the owner of any taxable property.
