


SCOTT LEARY BREAKS THE WORLD'S SWIMMING RECORD FOR FIFTY YARDS

Notable Performance Made at the Olympic Club During an Interesting Tournament—Young Athletes Perform in the Water for the Pleasure of Many Spectators



SCOTT LEARY, the champion amateur swimmer of the coast, broke the world's record at the Olympic Club swimming tournament last evening. He negotiated fifty yards in the fast time of 29 1/5 seconds and won the race, amid the plaudits of the large crowd that occupied seats around the tank.

Following are the results of the races: 25-yard dash—Won by Scott Leary, R. Cornell second. Time, 14.

50-yard dash—First heat won by P. Bevert, with a handicap of 8 seconds; Scott Leary second. Second heat won by R. Cornell, G. Clough second. Final won by Leary in 29 1/5, world's record.

100-yard dash—Won by Lester Hammer-smith, L. Orton second, D. Carroll third and P. P. P. fourth.

200-yard dash—Won by Dennis Carroll. Following were the officials: Starter, George James; Judges, Alex Page and J. Geddes; Timers, K. Malrose and Fred Ruiz; announcer, G. Hensley.
