

LEAGUE BOSS BOSSSES BEGIN TO MANIFEST OUTWARD SIGNS OF HOSTILITY.

Republican State Officers Strong Desire to Obtain Re-election.

Many active and influential Republicans of the city visited the headquarters of the Republican Primary League in the Baldwin annex yesterday.

The directors of the new organization have determined that the league shall not be used to assist candidates in obtaining nomination for office.

Suggestions have been advanced that the organization could add largely to its strength of membership if assurance were given that certain aspirants for office would receive the support of the league in the municipal nominating convention.

So many of the State officers elected in 1900 have served a second term that it is in order for a meeting of office-holders to make the declaration in favor of another term incumbent Henry T. Gage heads the list with aspirations to succeed himself as Governor.

Thomson, Superintendent of Public Instruction, is said to have no inclination to decline re-nomination. Jacob H. Sisson, State Auditor, is reported to have consented to accept the nomination in 1902.

In the Patna Division of Bengal the Cases Reach a Total of 437,681.


