Continued from Page Five. death of Dr. Langford and in the period which existed before the election of another general secretary it was forced to take responsibility upon the part of the first in giving or withholding the report of the Board of Missions. There are a hundred men in the church each of whom could pay the entire deficit without impairing his fortune.

The discussion was continued by the Rev. Mr. Tennessee. The last named suggested that a subscription be started during the meeting of the convention, and that the church should contribute to it. A friend had shown him three names on a card who wished to subscribe \$1000 each. He believed the whole deficit could be made up in this way and the impairment of the reserve be avoided.

The Bishop of Maryland made a personal friend of the late Dr. Langford and a missionary worker, spoke of a plan to raise a fund to meet the deficit. He had experience, and advocated an apportionment plan to obviate deficiencies in the treasury.

REV. DR. GREER MAKES AN EARNEST PROTEST

The Rev. Dr. Greer of New York followed, and said he wished to protest against the plan to raise a fund to meet the deficit. He had several times at the meeting of this Board of Missions that there were 400 Christian churches in connection with the church in the United States which contribute nothing and have contributed nothing during the last year.
