

ISSUES A CALL FOR CONVENTION

Effort to Have Chinese Exclusion Law Re-enacted.

Popular Appeal to Secure Prevention of Coolie Immigration.

The Supervisors' committee appointed recently by Mayor Phelan to make arrangements for a convention for the purpose of memorializing Congress and the President to re-enact the Chinese exclusion act met yesterday and decided to issue a call for the convention, to be held at Metropolitan Temple on November 21.

The Chinese exclusion act, after having been in existence for about ten years, will expire in May, 1902, and at the next session of Congress the question of its re-enactment should be decided.

The Chinese government, through its minister and consuls, has already attempted to influence public opinion by appeals and petitions and other means known to diplomacy.

It is sufficient now to remind the American people, should the bars be let down, that an aggressive immigration of Chinese would inundate this country and overwhelm its free working population.

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
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FLEET OF SHIPS THAT ANCHORED IN THE FOG SUNDAY NIGHT ARRIVES

The Advent of These Vessels Is Taxing the Capacity of the Port. The Rajore Encounters Some Heavy Weather Off the Farallones and One of the Sailors Is Washed Overboard

THE fleet of vessels that had to anchor outside Sunday night on account of the fog made port yesterday. The first of the fleet to show up was the bark S. C. Allen, twenty-four days from Honolulu; French bark Marguerite Molinos, 140 days from Cardiff; American ship L. J. Morse, twelve days from Port Wrangle; American bark Levi G. Burgess, six days from Tahiti; and the British ship British Columbia, six days from Swansea. The entire fleet made good runs, but as soon as the lightship was reached the fog shut down and the vessels had to anchor.

The Allen brings a cargo of 15,243 bags of sugar, the Rajore, general merchandise; the Henry Villard, sugar; the Marguerite Molinos, a cargo of coal for the Mare Island yard; the British Isles, 50,000 tons of salmon; and the Levi G. Burgess, 2450 tons of coal.

The Rajore sailed from Antwerp for San Francisco on May 19 and had variable winds throughout the voyage. On August 29 Henry Karlsson, a native of Sweden, aged 20 years, died of pneumonia and was buried at sea the next day. On July 29 the Rajore and the Sir Robert Borne, now 120 days from Liverpool, and the Enid, were in company off the Horn. The Rajore made the run from 50 to 50 in eleven days, and strange to say the British Isles, which anchored alongside her last Sunday, made the run in the same time.

Robbed the Mate. Saturday last Captain McAllister of the bark Martha Davis gave Mate Grinlay \$35 with which to pay the crew an advance.

Water Front Notes. The Mall Company's steamship City of Sydney will not take back her union crew. During the strike a Central American crew was shipped at half rates. These men are thoroughly incompetent, but as they mean to stay in the city the company they will be retained on the pay roll.

The British bark Haddon Hall, now in port, has been sold to J. R. Ellerman. There were ten ships, aggregating 38,000 tons burden, in the Hall line, Robert Alexander & Co. of Liverpool, and all of these were sold with the Haddon Hall. The latter ship will be turned over to her new owner when she reaches England.

T. M. Harrington, a boy, was caught in an elevator on the front yesterday, while James Zumbroff, a man, was being run over by an express wagon. Neither of them was seriously injured. They were attended to at the Harbor Hospital.

The German ship Windsbraut, out 126 days from South Shields for Valparaiso, arrived on the 13th, and the ship was locked up in the Harbor police station at the request of the French Consul.
