STOCKTON, Oct. 7.—Lizette Brown, with the aid of \$500 in hard cash, has managed to change her name to that of Mrs. Andreas Hulse. The transaction is accounted for in this way:

### OUR NATIONAL AILMENT.

#### Accidentally Killed by Comrade.

BAKERSFIELD, Oct. 7.—John Cronin, a laborer in the employ of the Sunset Railroad, was fatally shot accidentally yesterday afternoon by his chum, Frank Lamar, while they were hunting fourteen miles west of this city. Lamar was arrested and will be held pending the coroner's inquest. Cronin was taken to the Bakersfield-Kern Hospital, where he died shortly afterward. He said that the shooting was accidental. As Lamar was leading his gun after shooting a rabbit the weapon was discharged, the load entering Cronin's back above the hips, breaking the spinal column and incinerating the intestines.

#### Robbed by Masked Footpads.

BAKERSFIELD, Oct. 7.—L. P. Powers, a well-known resident of this city, was held up at the point of a pistol in the neighborhood of his home on Saturday night and robbed of \$16 by three masked footpads.

#### Nineteen Persons Go Down With Boat.

LISBON, Oct. 7.—Nineteen persons were drowned to-day by the foundering of a fishing boat in the bay of Peniche, just outside of the peninsula of Peniche.

### TRYING TO SAVE THE HOG DROVES

#### Growers Will Appeal to the State for Assistance.

Losses From the Epidemic Will Aggregate a Million Dollars.

REDDING, Oct. 7.—Owners of large droves of hogs in Northern California, with the assistance of Assemblyman J. A. Hubbard, have united in an effort to check the unparalleled plague which has carried off 300,000 hogs in the northern portion of the State during the past six months and whose present ravages threaten an aggregate loss of \$1,000,000. Mr. Hubbard has returned from Red Bluff, where a convention of the hog raisers of the five northern counties was held. It was decided not to ask for aid from the Federal Government, for fear this entire section would be quarantined. The State, which cannot declare a livestock quarantine, will be called upon.

The growers who assembled at Red Bluff described the various treatments they had used. One had found a teaspoonful of lime efficacious in the early stages of the disease, and another advised a teaspoonful of sweet spirits of niter and five or six drops of carbolic acid as a good preventive. One man from Colusa County, who had tried various remedies, lost his entire band of 300 hogs. The growers unanimously passed a resolution calling upon Professor Hilgard of the State University to send experts to investigate the disease. A meeting of delegates from all counties north of Sacramento will be held at Red Bluff on October 19, when further steps will be taken.

It is said that the meat of hogs which die of the plague is not affected, and the startling statement is made that packers will accept them when sick if they can be landed at the San Francisco packing-houses before death.

### ACCUSED OF STEALING FROM HIS BETROTHED

#### Bakersfield ex-Soldier Is Arrested on a Charge of Grand Larceny.

BAKERSFIELD, Oct. 7.—Thomas P. Joyce, an ex-soldier, was arrested last night on a charge of stealing from his betrothed. The warrant was sworn to by Mrs. Maggie Sternberg, the woman to whom, it is said, he was engaged to be married. According to the complaining witness, Joyce stole from her home a purse containing \$50. He had in his possession her gold watch and chain and some rings. For the past ten days he has not been seen, but last night he visited the home of Mrs. Sternberg at 1224 Seventeenth street and was arrested by Sheriff Borgwardt. Sheriff Francis Borgwardt says that when Joyce was taken into custody Mrs. Sternberg cried bitterly and declared that she thought much of the man she had accused of robbing her. Joyce denies his guilt and claims that a mistake has been made.

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### MURDERER CUTS VICTIM'S THROAT

#### Hunters Find Stranger's Body on the Bank of a Ditch.

Kings County Officials Deal With Crime That Develops Few Clues.

HANFORD, Oct. 7.—Officials of Kings County have to deal with a murder mystery that is baffling in its lack of substantial details upon which to work. The body of a young stranger, about 25 years of age, with the throat cut from ear to ear, was found to-day by hunters on the bank of the Last Chance Ditch, near Hanford. The corpse lay under a willow tree. The coroner, who made an examination, found that the larynx and both the inner and the exterior jugular veins were severed. That the man was murdered there is no doubt, as the physicians who examined the wounds say it would have been impossible for him to inflict them himself. The victim's face and right hand are bruised, as though he had struggled with his murderer. His clothing was stripped of everything of value and there is nothing by which to identify him. The place where the murder was committed is a lonely spot, and if the hunters had not accidentally stumbled across the body it might have lain there for days.

The young stranger had been seen around town several days with a companion, who has suddenly disappeared. The officers are satisfied that this companion committed the crime.

The dead man was well dressed and appeared to be in well-to-do circumstances.

### FUGITIVE CITY CLERK IS LOCATED IN HAVANA

SANDUSKY, O., Oct. 7.—A. W. Miller, formerly City Clerk, who left here last February and who is said to have made away with nearly \$100,000 of the city's funds, has been located at Havana, Cuba. Chief of Police Weingates and City Solicitor Henry Hart have gone after him. A telegram was received from Havana saying that Miller was there and asking what would be paid for his surrender. A reward of \$500 was voted by the Council and a reply was received that Miller would be turned over by his betrayer for that amount. A Cuban who made the offer said that Miller is poor, friendless and in a pitiable condition.

### CARS OF LOGGING TRAIN ROLL DOWN EMBANKMENT

#### One Man Killed and Three Injured in a Railroad Disaster Near Tuolumne.

TUOLUMNE, Oct. 7.—Five cars of the logging train of the Hetch Hetchy and Yosemite Valley Railroad Company jumped the track eight miles above here this morning and rolled down an embankment, instantly killing one of the trainmen and severely injuring three others. The person killed was Ralph Whitten and the others are J. E. Frewett, J. E. Prewett and William Murray.

It is said the accident was due to the bursting of the air hose between two of the cars. It occurred on a steep grade. The trainmen attempted to jump to the ground, but were too late and were caught in the wreck.

#### Dangerous Maniac at Large.

STOCKTON, Oct. 7.—A young man named Zimmerman, who hails from Napa, was last Friday taken to the Detention Hospital on account of his queer actions. Later he became violently insane. It was learned to-day that he escaped from the institution last Saturday night and has not been heard from since. He is considered a dangerous maniac.
