


STEAMSHIP MARIPOSA COMPLETES HER HUNDRED AND SECOND TRIP

Now Goes Into Retirement to Have New Boilers and an Ice Plant Put In and Engines Changed From Compound to Trip's Expansion--Captain Seymour Reaches Home From Bering Sea

THE Oceanic Steamship Company's Mariposa arrived from Honolulu yesterday, completing her one hundred and second trip. She was a day late owing to detention at the island port. The mail boat took from her 203 tons of freight and 1722 cases of cargo that detained the vessel. Among her inward cargo were 14,169 sacks of sugar, 1355 sacks of rice, 500 sacks of salt, 765 bales of wool, 495 bunches of bananas, 60 cases of fly traps, 5 cases of beet leaf and 200 cases of the new disinfecting the Mariposa will go to the Risdon Iron Works' shipyard to have new boilers put in and her engines changed from compound to triple expansion. SCHOONERS IN TROUBLE. C. H. Wheeler Springs a Leak and Albion Puts Back to Port.

The schooner Albion left here last Tuesday for Coquille River. Wednesday morning it was blowing a gale and when sixty miles southwest of the Farallones the schooner's foretop masthead was carried away. It was impossible to beat up west against the wind and when the vessel sprang a leak. The pumps were unable to keep the leak down and she came into port with four feet of water in the hold. She will be discharged and put on the drydock for an overhauling.

SCHOONER IMLAMA, ON WHICH CAPTAIN SEYMOUR DRIFTED AROUND IN BERING SEA FOR MORE THAN TWO MONTHS AND WHICH WAS FINALLY WRECKED ON THE SIBERIAN COAST.

The schooner Imlama was wrecked on the Siberian coast. Captain Seymour, who was on board, was rescued and returned to port. The schooner was found in a state of total ruin.

Had Two Narrow Escapes. Captain Charles Seymour, who twice nearly lost his life in Bering Sea, reached here Wednesday on the steamer Dora. The story of his narrow escapes was told in The Call two weeks ago. Seymour was captain of the schooner Imlama and with a crew of three men sailed on August 4. At the latter place he paid off his men and tied up the vessel. During a north-westerly gale the Imlama was driven to sea and went to sea, taking Seymour with her. For two months and fifteen days the boat was driven around Bering Sea and finally went ashore about fifty miles below Atka. All the provisions were lost, but Seymour got ashore and for two months and fifteen days subsisted upon fish and whatever birds he could snare. Finally the Indians found him and carried him to Atka, where he caught the schooner Challenge for Unalaska. At the latter place he took the Dora for San Francisco. When he reached Bering Sea the British steamer Opopok spoke the Imlama and offered to take Captain Seymour aboard. The latter would not leave his vessel, however, and the steamer would not tow her, so they parted company. The Opopok brought the story to Victoria, B. C., and from there it was telegraphed to The Call.

Departure of the Kosmos Line. The Kosmos line steamer Memphis was cleared yesterday for Hamburg and way ports with a general cargo valued at \$89,763, manifest and destined as follows: For Mexico, 30,025; Central America, 6730; Ecuador, 4364; Peru, 841,429; Chile, 138,273; Hamburg, 3229; Antwerp, 4605. The following were the principal cargo items: 1000 cases of sugar, 1000 cases of coffee, 1000 cases of rice, 1000 cases of flour, 1000 cases of oil, 1000 cases of wool, 1000 cases of cotton, 1000 cases of linen, 1000 cases of silk, 1000 cases of paper, 1000 cases of books, 1000 cases of medicine, 1000 cases of hardware, 1000 cases of tools, 1000 cases of furniture, 1000 cases of clothing, 1000 cases of shoes, 1000 cases of hats, 1000 cases of gloves, 1000 cases of socks, 1000 cases of underwear, 1000 cases of accessories.

Water Front Notes. The schooner Herman arrived from Kodiak yesterday after a good run of fourteen days. She brings fifty packages of furs for the American Commercial Company. The German ship Vasco da Gama will be loading wheat in a few days for Europe. She has been in the drydock and put in splendid shape for the run home. Captain Hold's many friends, especially the ladies, will be sorry to hear of his approaching departure. The new barkentine Georgiana, building at Eureka for J. Johnson, will be ready for launching in a few weeks. The new schooner to be named the A. F. Corcoran is being built at Grays Harbor for J. J. McKinnon. The schooner South Portland has been chartered by the Pacific Coast Steamship Company and will carry general merchandise to the Sound and coal to San Francisco.
